The Tartan beel-ring held its annual meeting at the home of Mr and Mrs Chas. The average weight of animals this year (103 1/2) improved upon that of last year by seven pounds and a fraction. There were still a large number under the regulation standard—14— which materially swelled the balance on hand now devoted to the erection of a new slaughter house, for which an energetic committee has been formed to see to its completion.
