Unveiling Glenelg Tablet

Glenelg and its council of 1919 have honored themselves by erecting a fitting memorial to commemorate her boys who enlisted in the great war and especially those who fell in the path of duty.

In restoring the burned Hall the suggestion was made, that a memorial porch or oratorium should be provided in which should be placed in enduring granite a record of the names.

It is a beautiful memorial of granite, 8 feet long, 4 feet deep, 10 inches thick and weighing 420 lbs.

77 names are carved on the stone four columns of 15 names, each record those who enlisted and who returned.

"OUR FALLEN HEROES" and the following 17 names follow:
