Ottawa in a Swither

The Union government at Ottawa is not having happy times these days. First Sir Robert Borden wanted to resign, but that was staved off, though he is merely nominal head now as he is planning distant trips for his health.

Then several other members became restless and there being difficulty in getting new men to take their place some shuffling of portfolios was made to ease the situation.

Another indication of internal trouble is the abandonment of certain campaigning trips which had been planned for Ontario, the West and the Maritime provinces. They must feel that they are getting out of touch with public opinion and the determination to hang on till 1923 as a Union government is most unpopular even with some of their press supporters.

If the Dury government would but make some big mistake to discredit the ominous shadow of a coming farmer's victory in the Dominion, it would give comfort at Ottawa. But Mr Dury is not likely to be obliging.

Ten of Mexico's States were shaken by an earthquake on Saturday and many lives were lost. It was also felt at the Canary Islands.

The United States Congress is again in Session and will struggle with the peace treaty, striving to reach a compromise whereby the country would not stand aloof from sanctioning to the full the great principle of the League of Nations.

Sir Adam Beck was taken very critically ill in England, and man apprehensions were felt lest his great influence would be lost to Hydro development. He is recovering.

Joseph Sesgram, the great hosiery man and prominent distiller, who died recently, left an estate of over four million dollars.

The Wheat Board has ordered the price of wheat to mills in Canada raised from \$2.30 to 2.80, and bread in Ontario may advance two cents.

The Sinn Feiners are piling up tragedy upon tragedy. Another attack was made on the Vice Regal Lodge last week and several lives were lost. The bloody and barbarous spirit exhibited is losing them support and is leading men like John Dillon to rouse the Nationalists to favor again among sane Irishmen:

Church Honors Heroes

The solemn unveiling of a memorial pulpit which the parishioners have erected in St. John's Church, on the 4th concession of the township of Glenelg to the honor of forty-five of their brave sons who fought in the Great War—eight of whom made the supreme sacrifice—and one of whom was decorated for bravery, was held on Sunday afternoon, December 21. The Rev. Father Pickett of the Basilican Fathers of Owen Sound, a returned Chaplain and formerly a member of the parish, delivered an eloquent sermon, and the pastor, Rev. Father Flahaven, removed the large British flag from over the brass tablets which are set in the front of the pulpit. The tablets bear the names of the fallen heroes and of all the returned men who saw service overseas. The tablets are a beautiful piece of work and were designed and executed by Mr. S. Nelson of the Metal Studios Ltd., Hamilton, Ont. The pulpit, built by the Globe Furniture Company, of Waterloo, Ont., gives a finishing touch to an already beautifully decorated interior and is a fitting tribute of gratitude and respect for the brave sons of the parish who did their part so nobly in the Great War.

Quebec vs. St. John

We have received a letter from Rev. Dr. Farquharson who is now stationed at St. John, N. B., and incidentally contains a paragraph of such historical interest, that we venture to print it. We are sure many friends here will read with interest:

"I have been here nearly three weeks and am beginning to know my bearings in the old city. It is in many ways, a contrast with Quebec. In that city on the St. Lawrence the streets are all or nearly all saints, so that you, as it were, tread softly in sacred company. Here the streets are Kings, Queens, Dukes, Princes, courtiers, statesmen and soldiers. Worthy names many of them are no doubt, but most of their classes, have popularly been excluded from the lists of the saints. One street I see bears the name Germain—I suppose that is to the honor of the notorious home secretary of Geo. III who bungled the country into the war with the American States and still worse bungled the conduct of the war so that what should have been a victorious ending was the reverse.

That same Germain had a checked course. He was cashiered from the Brandy by Geo. II for cowardice in the battle. I think of Minden. Chance brought him into acquaintance with the grandson of Geo. II, (the prince who was later Geo. III) and his mother. His disgrace by the grandfather was a commendation to the grandson who chose all his friends from those rejected by his grandfather. As soon as Geo. 2nd died Germain became the King's advisor in a practically Premier. So Carlton, then Governor General of Canada who had reported against him at Minden, had to be superseded by Burgoyne in the conducting of the war and so the list of 'd' feats began."
