The Town Manager

Many newspapers throughout the Dominion are advocating town and city manager form of municipal government in lieu of the aldermanic form. The question of a change in the system is being considered at Bellville, and Ald. Riggs, a member of the Council, has been successful in collecting information regarding the success of the scheme in other centres. The town of Anamosa, Iowa, with a population of 3,000 adopted the town manager plan a short time ago, doing away with the council and mayor. The town manager receives \$1800 a year, and Mayor Beems, in telling of the experiment says:

"The plan has been in operation such a short time that it is a little too soon to come to conclusion regarding its efficiency over the old plan, but we find that by combining the various petty offices, that were in vogue, under a one man management, that the affairs of the town are being looked after in a more business-like way than heretofore, without any additional expense.

The town owns the waterworks and the manager acts in the capacity of water commissioner, town marshal, town clerk, and secretary of the commercial enterprises of the town.

So far everyone seems to be well pleased with the change and from the number of towns that are adopting the same plan we are of the opinion that the town manager plan is the solution of the town and city government problem."

The Peace Treaty has been signed at last and League of Nations formally installed, only the United States holding aloof and consequently is still at war with Germany under an armistice! Pres Wilson, head of the League, has issued a call for the first meeting at which his own country will not be represented!! Riots have broken out in Berlin and at least ten dead.

Lieut. Gov. Clark has broken the bounds of decorum by making a speech condemning all and sundry who propose to abolish Government House. Such a step he says would be a "calamity" and lead to Bolshevism. Mr. Clark's break may lead to one of two things—his resignation or the dismissal of his responsible ministers which would mean another election. Will he try it?

Seats for Premier Drury and Manning Doherty have been found it is expected, the former in Norfolk and the latter in East Kent. Hon. Mr Raney will have to stand a little longer as it is a ticklish proposition to find a farmer constituency that will support a Toronto lawyer. But when a lawyer is necessary and one of such worth as Mr Raney presents, why should the old antipathy prevail?

New Members of County Council

There will be a number of changes in the personnel of the County Council when it meets this month. No less than three new faces will be there from Owen Sound, out of four representatives from the town. St Vincent, Sullivan, Chatsworth, Sarawak, Bentinck, Dundalk, Egremont and Glenelg will all send new representatives. And there is going to be a real scrap for the wadenship with at least four in the field for the honors. Reeves McKenzie, of Artemesia; Sing McFarland; Morrison of Osprey and Miller of Euphrasia, an aspirant to the honor and at least three of them have quite a large following. Just when one will be elected is hard to say at present and it may be that a "dark horse" will come forward and win out from all those at present suggested.
