Mildmay team which has been making a stir in the hockey world this winter, appeared in Durham last Thursday and in a well played game met defeat 7-1. Play was not so fast and thrilling as in some previous encounters this season and some doubt existed before the match as to the locals chances of victory. At end of first period Durham led only 2-1, but the second dispelled all doubts of the ultimate outcome when four straight Durham counters made it 6-1. Durham secured the only goal scored in last period.

Any systematic team work was not evident by either line up, though at times some pretty combination play was carried out by the Durhams. 3 or 4 of the goals were scored on lone rushes by Zimmerman who showed his best game ever played here. His speed and poke check were telling factors in the victory. Jim McLachlan at right defence also scintillated, and Ernie McDonald in goal blocked everything but one which the player shot from close on the nets. Pletch at right defence was Mildmay's outstanding star. He is big and speedy, as pretty a stick handler as ever seen here, with an accurate speedy shot. Presbyterian Annual Meeting Breaks the Record Again With Buoyant Finances

The Annual meeting of Durham Presbyterian Church was held on Monday. There was a fair attendance, townspeople in the majority, and it being felt that even more would attend if the meeting was arranged for the evening instead of the afternoon.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises by Pastor Whaley, who also presided. Many of the smaller reports were adopted as printed, but all showed encouraging progress, in nearly every instance the funds having "gone over the top" as compared with previous years.

There are 159 families in the congregation with a membership roll of 413. The "In Memoriam" list showed eleven deaths during the year.

The enrolment in the Sunday School proper, Adult Bible Class, Senior Bible Class, Home Department and Cradle Roll numbered 235, with receipts of \$316.83 with Missionary givings of \$81.66. Two affiliated Union S. Schools at No. 9 School House, Glenelg, and at Edge Hill, also show good work being done under Superintendents W. J. Young and W. J. Ritchie respectively.

The Women's Missionary Society showed collections and donations of over \$400 and \$400 of this went for Mission purposes. The Mission Bands under Mrs. Whaley's Presidency has shown unwavering vigor and a good work is being done amongst the young, by developing the Missionary spirit.

The Ladies' Aid, whose receipts in war time ran into four figures, has this year receded, but still have good work to their credit. They made a handsome donation to the robing of the choir and met the expense of the Memorial Tablet to fallen soldiers.

Outside of congregational work proper interest is taken in the Dominion Alliance the Leper Mission, Christian Men's Brotherhood, Bible Society, Knox College Missionary Society, &c, some hundreds of dollars going to these causes.

The feature of the year was the work undertaken by the Managers in redecorating the interior of the church and in painting and in other ways making the exterior presentable. The combined work cost about \$1200.00 and few but thought that some of this expense would have to be carried over. However, without canvass, or any special effort, the money flowed in and the year which began with a balance on hand of \$450 ended with a smaller balance of \$110, but with every obligation met.

The same buoyancy was shown in Mission givings. An objective of \$1300.00 was aimed at but a sum of \$1880 was reached, \$100 of this being a bequest from the late Mrs. Leslie, who has also left another \$100 for the specific purpose of improving church grounds. No less a sum than \$1818 was allocated among the eight schemes of the church: Home Missions and Foreign Missions getting \$730 each.

Thos. G. Lauder, J. C. Adams, W. J. Derby, C. Ramage were re-elected Managers.

Towards the close of the meeting the chairman (Mr. Whaley) was asked to retire and in his absence discussion took place on increase of salary. It was decided to grant a similar increase to that of last year \$150.00, making the stipend \$1700.00 Mr. Whaley was recalled and gratefully thanked the congregation when informed of the step taken.

After thanks to various bodies for special services, the benediction was pronounced and adjournment made to the basement where a pleasant social hour was spent and refreshments served.

Death of Mr Alfred Ashley

The community was shocked to learn on Tuesday of the startlingly sudden death of Mr Alfred Ashley, a progressive young farmer of Bentinck about a mile north of town. Thursday and Friday last he was not feeling well, but up to Saturday attended to his farm duties. Sunday a doctor was consulted who pronounced it a case of "flu." Monday gave no encouragement and on Tuesday he passed into the beyond at the early age of 32, a young man in his prime.

He was born near Brampton, where his father and two brothers still live. His mother died while he was in his infancy and the home was broken up. Alfred grew up with the family of Mr Geo. Cuff at Hutton Hill, which he looked upon as his home. Eight years ago he married Miss May Hopkins a daughter of Samuel Hopkins, north of Allan Park, and the young wife with two small children, will have the deep sympathy of the community in their sore bereavement.

Two years ago come March he bought the Catton farm, and humanly speaking was giving promise of useful citizenship. His neighbors speak of him in warm terms and his sudden taking off is a severe saying "Be ye also ready."

Besides the brothers in Brampton, another, Aaron Ashley lives in Durham, another brother, is near Walkerton and a sister is Mrs. McCallum, near Elmwood.
