A NONAGRARIAN—An obituary notice this week tells of the death of a Durham pioneer at Unity, Sask. Mr. Aaron Vollet, at the great age of 94 years. He was an uncle of Clerk Vollet of town and was the last of a large family who bulked very largely in the business life of the early days of Durham.

Oscar recently sold his 100 acre farm near Ayton to Mr. Henry J. Damm for \$10,700, and is holding a sale of stock and implements on Feb. 18th. Last Thursday some clothing hanging near the stove pipes in his home, took fire and spread, but the blaze was noticed and extinguished before any great damage was done.

DIED IN TORONTO—Taken suddenly ill, John Atrowsmith, son of Mrs. S. Atrowsmith of Durham, died at his home in Toronto last Thursday night. The deceased was fifty four years of age and left town many years ago. He was a printer having learned his trade in the Chronicle office under Mr. Johnston's management. During the day last Thursday he had gone home from work feeling ill, was seized with a hemorrhage, to which he was subject and died almost instantly. Obituary

MRS. JOHN HANLAN
After a two weeks' illness from diphtheria, Mrs. John Hanlan, Toronto, died in the Isolation hospital there, aged 43 yrs. 7 mos. She was formerly Miss Emma McLean, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh McLean of town and when in Durham years ago was employed in the Chronicle Office. For about 24 years she has lived in the city, being wedded to Mr. Hanlon 17 years ago. He died a year ago last November from pneumonia following influenza. Nine sisters and brothers besides the sorrowing parents remain: Dan, in Brit. Columbia; Hugh, in Galt; Robt. and Jas. and the three sisters, Messames D. B. McFarlane, G. A. Thompson and W. Rabb in Durham. The remains were brought to Durham Saturday for interment, Rev. Mr. McEwen conducting the services.

MRS. WM. WHALEY
The above lady died at the home of her uncle, Mr. W. B. Vollet on Saturday morning last after weary months, if not years of suffering from pernicious anaemia. She was Miss Gertrude Sutherland, a native of Durham and a daughter of the late John Sutherland who died at Fort William some years ago. Shortly after passing from her girlhood she became a victim of a spinal trouble, which troubled her for years. She had great native energy and ambition and became an accomplished musician in spite of her troubles. Her love of music soothed for her many weary hours.

A little over three years ago she was married to Capt. Whaley, who shortly afterwards proceeded to the war. Meanwhile she made her home with her mother, Douglas at Fort William and Munro in B. C. In search of health she spent some time in California, but came east last November little improved, but rejoicing to get to Durham to the hospitable home of her beloved uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Vollet. She took hospital treatment in Toronto, but without betterment, and came home to die among friends in her native town. Capt. Whaley since returning has been assiduous in his attentions and has the sympathy of all who knew the bright, winsome spirit who has gone.

She was interred in Trinity Church cemetery on Monday where her parents lie. Rev. Mr. Hardy conducting funeral services, assisted by Rev. Mr. Whaley.

MISS VERA HOPKINS
The call that is sure and certain came to Miss Vera Hopkins in Glenelg on Thursday, Feb. 5th and claimed her as his victim. Vera has not been a robust health since she had the flu over a year ago, though up and around until lately with about one week confined to bed. The funeral was on Saturday to English Church cemetery, her pastor, Rev. Mr. Cole conducting the services at the house and grave. Beautiful floral offerings were given from Mr. and Mrs. Robt. Tied Round with Palmerston

Durham 4; Palm.-Listowel 2

After two hard-fought games to determine the championship of this Northern district, Durham and Palmerston teams are no nearer a decision, for Palmerston-Listowel won 8 to 6 at home last Monday, and last night Durham beat them 4-2 here. The round is now tied and a sudden death game in Mt. Forest will now decide it, probably next Monday night.

It was a brilliant game Wednesday, sparkling with speed and some good teamwork, Durham having a slight margin on their larger opponents. It should have been Durham's round as well as game, as the score was rightfully 5-2, but the opposition goal umpire couldn't see a goal everyone else noticed, so he was banished. However the goal didn't count for Durham. E. Murphy of Mt. Forest refereed.

At 7 15 p. m. Durham and Mt. Forest girls played an exhibition, Mt. Forest winning 1-0. The teams were evenly matched. We regret time and space forbid details of the games.

Walkerton was Outclassed

Reinforced with almost one hundred rosters, the much vaunted Walkerton hockey team, prospective district champions, arrived here last Friday afternoon, and returned a disappointed crowd a few hours later when Durham had turned in 8-2 score against them. To accomplish this, the whole Durham team played sterling hockey and provided the fans with their best showing this winter. During the first two periods, Durham scored 3 each to 0 for their opponents, the puck was seldom past centre ice and such was the disparity that even to the Walkerton crowd it must have seemed that their pets had little more than their sticks and a prayer. In the third period, either Walkerton got roused up, or the Durhams let up, with a safe lead, perhaps a little of both, for the play was quite even and each team scored twice.

In the second session a regrettable accident occurred when Wettaufer of Walkerton collided with Jim McLachlan, un-noticed till too late—with such force as to break the former's collar bone and lay him up the rest of the season. As he was a fast wing man and a good shot it was seriously cripple Walkerton's district chances as they have no equal sub players. No one regretted the happening more than Jim who also suffered a sore shoulder for a few days as a result. Big players as both teams referee and other witnesses agree that the event was entirely accidental.

Referee Legz of London gave good satisfaction and had no need to impose a single penalty, so clean was the game. We fail to see however why big players should be given to bring a referee here from London when a fully capable man might be secured in Mt. Forest or some other nearby town for less than half the price.

Durham goes to Southampton Thursday to play the lake soldiers who are being touted as coming district champs, but if our boys continue the form exhibited here Friday, they might even spill the beans right at home for Southampton. With such a win they would again be right in the running. On present form they are the best team in the district and if goals counted on the home and home games already played Durham would be on the top perch.
