Doug. McKinnon strikes Some Stride

We believe we are quite safe in asserting that Dougald McKinnon has established a world record as an amateur walker. He struck out with the stride of a Mohawk from his home on the 13th of Sullivan to Chesley, a distance of 31 miles and made it in half an hour. That beats the Grand Trunk's record some days this winter. A strong wind was striking Doug at right angles. With a pale rearward careening him over the snow he believes he could have made the distance in at least five minutes less time. The average traveler who hits a 31 mile pace in an hour is going some. At this point we had better explain that though Doug had never studied geometry he followed the principle laid down in the 47th proposition of the First Book of Euclid, a.c. cording to Hamblin Smith, and saved space by cutting the corners. From his place to Scone is two miles and from Scone to Chesley 11 miles but by following the longest side of a right-angled triangle he saved a mile so that he really only walked 21 miles on the crust in half an hour. There's a great saving in distance by going straight as the crow flies. Peary, the Arctic explorer, failed when he tried roundabout routes on five different occasions but succeeded in reacting the North Pole on April 6, 1909, when he took a course straight north. Fixed Date for Ont. Elections

Score One for Drury Govern't

A bill introduced into the Ontario Legislature makes provision for the holding of elections on a fixed date. The date for Nominations is the second Thursday in October every fourth year, polling on second Monday thereafter, thus giving 10 days instead of 7 between the two functions.

This is a great step in advance and will prevent the uncertainty of the opposition side as to the date of the contest. This uncertainty was part of the jockeying for advantage of the party in power who could prepare their election literature in the dark while their opponents knew not whether to prepare or not.

The bill announces also that the present parliament will expire the 1st of August 1921. No announcement as to by-elections has been given but it is to be considered in committee and the Premier asks for suggestions to make a "perfect Election Act."

Many other features of the bill show careful thought. Municipal lists only will be used, polling hours 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Voters' Lists to be in three parts as formerly. Assessor to enter all names on list. Appeals made free and ample provision made for soldiers, sailors, men in hospitals, &c.

Nothing more sensible has been done in many years and is a direct result of cutting loose from partyism.
