All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year, 1919,

received or earned \$1,000 or more. CLASS 1

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920: Trustees, executors, administrators, agents and assignees must use Form

Employers making return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5.

Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues - and all such penalties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and col-

Any person, whether taxable or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to penalty of \$100.00 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000. or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.
