Not So Fast, Owen Sound

A special meeting of the County Council held last week in Owen Sound revealed the fact that there is decided opposition to Owen Sound cutting connection with Co Grey to become a city.

It is freely charged that this would be a violation of an agreement entered into by the whole County including Owen Sound for a certain appropriation for good roads and a withdrawal now for the avowed purpose of jescaping obligations and saving several thousands of dollars, savors of selfishness. A committee of four which includes Calder and Boyd, was appointed to safeguard the interests of the County before the Legislature or elsewhere.
