Granted \$500 Towards Monument

Town Council had a Busy Session Monday Evening

Making a grant of \$500 to the Memorial Committee towards the purchase of a monument, purchasing a siren fire alarm, reducing the dog tax, authorizing the survey of all tanks and engine stands in the town and discussion re appointment of a constable was the main business transacted at Monday's meeting of Durham Council. All members were present.

The recent fire at McLan's stable brought to light the fact that a certain portion of the south end of the town, was without proper fire protection, as Camp's creek and the nearest tank were both too far distant from that fire for the hose available. The residents of that vicinity petitioned the Council for a tank near by. It was also shown that the engine stand at the east side of McKechnie's dam was useless and would anyway be soon closed off, being on private property.

At last regular meeting of the purchase of a siren fire alarm to be installed at the Furniture Factory was authorized. Councillor Lloyd had a circular illustrating various sirens, and one costing \$44 was decided on. A motion of Reeve Calder's that a satisfactory trial be requested before payment, prevailed.

At a special meeting in March the Council sold the Furber building, formerly the McKechnie Sash and Door Factory to Dr. G. Herlitschka for a chemical manufacturing plant at \$1500 for the building. Councillor Saunders had a lively tilt for a few moments with Mayor Grant and Clerk Vollet and the air grew warm, Mr. Saunders claiming he had not been properly notified of this meeting. It was the general opinion that a fairly good sale had been made.

The Town still owns a considerable amount of wood-working machinery in this building which they desire to sell. Reeve Calder is to see machinery firms in Toronto next week regarding its disposal, advantageously if possible.

A tax of \$5 on dogs and \$8 on bitches for the last three years was thought too high by many. Mayor Grant stated he considered it a war measure only. A motion of Reeve Calder, seconded by Dr. Smith, passed, that the tax be reduced to \$3 for dogs and \$7 for bitches.

Reeve Calder re-introduced the subject of a grant to the Memorial committee for the erection of a monument to the fallen heroes of Durham and surrounding townships. The Council took no action in this at Feb. meeting. Councillor Saunders took strong objection to the town making a grant without a vote of the ratepayers, when some of the citizens favored other propositions such as a hospital or Memorial Hall. Coun. Smith while personally in favor of a monument clearly brought out that no steps had been taken towards either of these suggested memorials, but the monument would be built in the town anyway, was all planned for, and it would become the town to refuse to contribute something to this memorial. A resolution moved by Councillors Lloyd and Smith that the town grant \$500 to the Memorial Com for this purpose, carried by 4 to 2. Councillors Lloyd, Allen, Smith, Fifth in favor, Saunders and Murdoch against. Reeve Calder from personal reasons refrained from voting.

Mr. Thos. Danie's yet acting constable as no permanent appointment could be made. Only one finalication was in that of Mr. T. C. Morton. Mayor Grant and Mr. Allan moved that he be appointed at \$100 increase in salary. \$700 and Mr. Morton being present, was asked if acceptable. It is no use to me, good night" pointedly remarked the latter as he left the room. With work on the streets and town hall caretaking which are included with the constable's duties, it was realized by the Council that under present day conditions of living, no need man could be secured for much less than \$1000 a year. The salary will doubtless be increased and the Council expects to appoint a reliable man at next special meeting, who will see that law and order are enforced on our streets.

The Publishers A "Tuxis" Movement

Mr. Ernest McGill of Toronto University, while home for his holidays, tried, in altruistic mood, to help his home town by interesting the churches in the great work for "teen age boys represented by the "Tuxis" movement. He had a meeting of the four churches called on Wednesday evening in the Presbyterian Ch. and a fair representation of these churches, listened to the young enthusiast in this line work as he outlined its beginnings, all in this century) its aims and objects and the success it had met with elsewhere.

The movement is intended to develop young boys "four square," that is intellectually, physically, religiously and socially; to make Jesus Christ a hero of the boys where he is too often a dim personality. This is done by forming the boys into organized groups and stimulating their ambition by personal grading on all four lines.

What is "TUXIS"? The X in the middle stands for Christ (as we use it in "Xmas"). On each side of Him and close to Him is "T" (you) and "I" (the "I" stands for training and the "S" for service—that is you and I in training for service in the cause of Christ.

The four fold development is based on our Saviour's life as told in Luke 2: 52 "And Jesus increased in wisdom (intellectually) and stature (physically) and in favor with God (religiously) and man (socially).

An advisory committee comprising Rev. Mr. Hardy Will Glass, Thos. Allan, John A. Graham was appointed to attend to organization and we hope will be very successful.
