

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable. Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise,

who falls to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprison-
