73 Majority in Legislature

For Temperance Resolution

The request for a Referendum from the Province to the Dominion as embodied in the "McCreary Resolution" in the Legislature, was carried on Tuesday by 73 majority, the vote being 85 for and 12 against.

There was an amendment, (Brackin's) and an amendment to the amendment (Hill's), the former wanting delay to send a stated case to the courts to test legality the latter objecting to a private member bringing in the resolution.

The Hill amendment was supported by only 18 Conservatives, the Brackin amendment by 22 members (1 Conservative, 16 Liberals, 5 Labor.)

Then followed the McCreary Resolution, for which both Brackin and Hill voted when their amendments were lost. The 12 who voted against comprised: 3 Labor, 4 Liberal, 5 Conservative.

Premier Drury emphatically declared: "If the Dominion Government does not implement this wish of the people, this government will implement it."

The Provincial request will now go on to Ottawa, which will order another Referendum and if this is carried, all importation of liquor for beverage purposes from outside the province will cease.

This round-about method was totally unnecessary after the decisive vote last year and we may thank the unprogressive elements at Ottawa, especially the Senate for the extra trouble and great expense.

Millions for Education

Says Minister R. H. Grant, M. P. P.

In a speech at Ottawa, the new Minister of Education, made it clear that some drastic action is needed to ensure better educational facilities in rural districts. He presented the following startling statistics:

In 1919 Ontario had out of a total of 5,757 rural schools, five schools with an average attendance of one pupil, twelve schools with an average attendance of two, 31 schools with three, 48 schools with four, 79 schools with five, 479 schools with six, and 1493 schools with less than ten pupils. Under conditions such as these it was not possible to educate properly the boys and girls in the eastern

part of the Province and it would be his endeavor to bring about a different condition of affairs throughout the country districts.



Death of Hon. A. G. MacKay

One of the Most Noted Sons of the County of Grey

Satu day last there died at Edmonton, Alta. from after effects of pneumonia, Hon. A. G. MacKay, Minister of Health and Municipal Affairs in the government of Alberta.

Mr. MacKay was born in Sydenham township on 7th March 1860, got his education in the County and at Osgoode Hall, taught school for several years and took up the profession of law in which he distinguished himself. Always a Liberal, he rose in his party in Ontario till he was chosen as their leader in 1907 and made a remarkable speaking tour in 1908, but the country returned the Whitney government. He resigned leadership in 1911 but ran in election of that year and made his greatest triumph, securing a majority of 741 over his old opponent Mr Boyd.

He went to Alberta in 1912 and soon was accorded high place in his profession there and in politics also, rose to a position in the government of the province. The remains are to be brought to O S and for interment. Tributes are being paid to his ability by press and parliament. Mr MacKay was unmarried.

Canada Won World's Championship

At the Olympic games he'd in Antwerp, Belgium, Canada's champion hockey team, the Falcons of Winnipeg captured the world's hockey honors in a competition by seven nations. Czechoslovakia was easily 15 to 0, then the real game was with United States, which had a picked team of their star players and the Canucks beat them 2 to 0. The final was with Sweden, Canada winning 12-1. It was a signal triumph for the Dominion and the games prove that hockey as played in Canada and the States is much faster and more scientific than Europe's best.

Justice to Postmasters

The public of late while asking from postmasters for Blank Income Tax returns, must have been impressed with the multifarious duties imposed on the postmasters. Not only have they the usual run of duties, selling stamps, issuing money orders, war stamps and war saving certificates, registering mail matter and making elaborate reports at frequent intervals of all business, but the war placed upon them many extra duties of which the public have little conception. Small wonder the Canadian Postmasters Association see in all this and their long hours many of them have, with few or no unbroken holidays, reason for complaint, especially since their fees are wretchedly inadequate in some cases being based on a scale made at Confederation.

Then again salaries are based upon revenue, a system possibly fair enough, when there were no mail order houses, no advertising by catalogues, booklets, &c, no rural mails nor great city dailies, but changed now since rural post-offices are to a great extent delivery agents for mail matter originating in the cities, and this and similar work should not be based on number of stamps sold, but because of the importance of the business.

Millions of letters and pamphlets were sent out during the war. The Public Information Department claim they sent out eight million pamphlets in one year, the handling of which was all extra work on postmasters. Moreover, they were expected to check up and report errors in the payment of assigned pay and allowances to married soldiers' dependants and others, and it claimed saved government many thousands of dollars by so doing. Yet, while other civil servants received increases they were tied down to the Confederation scale, except an insignificant increase in 1918.

The conditions above and other abuses especially rear allowance, have just been brought to our notice in a circular issued by the Postmaster's Association. It certainly is an eye-opener, and we hope the government will accede to the wishes by granting a more generous scale. There are over 12000 Post Offices in the Dominion and of these about 8000 postmasters get an average salary of \$60. 87 per annum; 321 get \$450 and have to keep an assistant; 295 get over \$1000 but must keep two assistants. Only 30 get \$1000 and over but have to keep from 5 to 10 assistants.

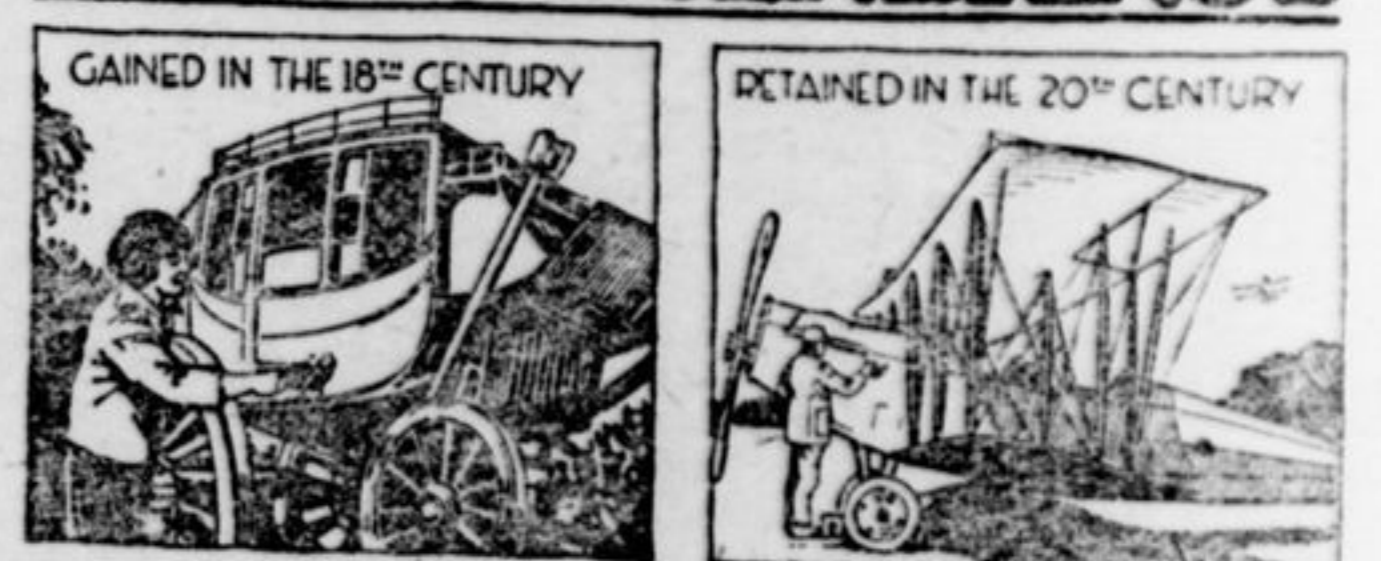
