"The fire, which was started in a waste-paper basket, is supposed to have been caused by a cigarette butt. The above summarizes the cause.

But for the fortunate discovery by a passing policeman at 11 o'clock at night, a valuable manufacturing plant would have been in ruins, a large number of employees would have been out of work, and considerable time would necessarily have elapsed before operations could be renewed.

The 1919 amendment to the Criminal Code provides that "Bveryone is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to two years' imprisonment who by negligence causes any fire which occasions loss of life or loss of property."
