Mary MacDougall Cameron

We announced briefly last week the death of this lady but her character and personality, even though in her 80th year, demands a longer notice, and we return to the subject with a melancholy pleasure that we were privileged to meet with her on the journey through life, though briefly. She died on the 29th April, after only a week's illness, following an attack of heart trouble.

Mrs Cameron was born in Iona, Scotland on March 10, 1841. She was a daughter of Allan MacDougall and Catherine Cameron MacDougall early pioneers in Bentinck township and though for the past 34 years she has been a resident of Bottineau, N. Dak., she always kept in touch with South Grey and the ever-increasing number of "grown-ups" she knew in early days. Her last visit "home" was in the summer and fall of 1918, and those who met her on that visit will long cherish the memory of the attractive old lady whose memory, vivacity and intelligence enabled her to deal with things old and new, things past and present as few of her age can.

She is survived by two brothers, Dan MacDougall of Medicine Hat and Neil MacDougall of Westport, N. Dak., both well known Bentinck men, also by four sons and one daughter, Mrs. M. J. Weaver of Bottineau, and several grandchildren. Other family connections abound in Ontario, notably in the law and steel-making, Mr and Mrs John Greenwood, and in Wrexeter, Lisowel, Port Egin and other Bruce and Huron points.

Funeral services were conducted at her home in Bottineau and in the First Presbyterian church by her pastor, Rev. Jones. Interment was made May 3rd, in Oak Creek cemetery, Bottineau, beside the graves of her husband, John Cameron and her mother.
