Origin of the MacQueen Clan

The founder of the Highland Clan MacQueen is said to have been Rodrick Dhu Rovan Macsweyn MacQueen. About the beginning of the fifteenth century he received a grant of land in the County of Inverness, the name of property being Corrybaugh. MacQueen belonged to the family of the Lord of the Isles and his descendants from him were called the Clan Rovan. The MacQueens fought under the standard of MacIntosh, captain of the Clan Chattan at the Battle of Harlaw in 1411. On April 4th, 1909, Donald MacQueen of Corrybaugh signed the bond of manrent with the chiefs of the other tribes composing the Clan Chattan, whereby they bound themselves to support Angus McIntosh as their captain and leader. At this period the clan of MacQueen is said to include twelve distinct families, all landlords in the counties of Inverness and Nairn.

He pointed out the danger of class feeling: "We cannot live to ourselves, the only way to be prosperous was to have all prosperous." There was danger in class clashes, there was danger of capital running shy, there was danger in the formation of a predatory class, but if all forces unite in true brotherhood feeling, "Everyman will earn what he gets and get what he earns." The hope of the future lies in a broader outlook and more people than ever were thinking beyond themselves.

The Kings and Queens of this country are its men and women, and we must forget ourselves as we did during the war. Parks and other functions will fail if we have not the community spirit and again he emphasized his leading thought that one class could not prosper if all did not prosper.

Mr. Drury is a capital speaker, has a fine platform manner and one is impressed that he is a man of genuine principles and ranks totally above a mere party politician.

At the close of his address, Mr Short, a well known Proton farmer, read an address from the Farmers' clubs of South and Centre Grey and Dufferin. Among Mr Drury's remarks in reply was an admission that he had had to use courage and backbone, all sorts of people were pressing for position, but he was glad to say that fewer than the fingers of two hands were from the U. F. O. organization, a statement receiving hearty applause.

Bob Wilson, a comedian, gave some lighter touches and was encored. The recitations of Miss Grace Bonnick were in good taste and splendidly presented and deserved the encores demanded. Last but not least was the fine music by the band at intervals.
