40 TAX MILL RATE AT HARRISTON.—The tax rate for Harriston has been fixed at 40 mills for this year, distributed as follows: County rate 6 1/2 mills; town rate 12 1/2 mills; debenture rate 10 1/2 mills; Library rate 4 mill; Public School 7 1/2 mills; high school 6 1/2 mills; memorial monument 2 mills. By present outlook Durham's new tax rate will be but very little below Harriston.

G. W. V. A's. Second Annual Celebration

Favored with splendid weather, but with circumstances otherwise not so favorable, the G. W. V. A. Dominion Day celebration here came off successfully, though not to the degree anticipated. Owen Sound's city celebration that day was the big magnet for this section of the country and many from this neighborhood motored up to the new Georgian Bay City. However almost two thousand of the residents of town and district were loyal to the big day at home, and in the main were well satisfied with the bill of sports presented by the local returned boys. Everything advertised was carried out, excepting the tug-of-war between Bentinck and Glenelg teams for a silver cup. Bentinck was on hand with their stalwarts, but Glenelg could not gather a sufficient representation so the event was not contested. The horse races were not all that was desired but this was no fault of the local management who offered good prizes. The non-appearance of more equines was solely due to the fact that Owen Sound, Port Elgin and other centres were holding similar races, and there are scarcely enough fast horses in this part of the province to go round.
