43 Mills is Durham's 1920 Tax Rate

The Town Council Monday evening fixed the tax rate at 43 mills, 5 more than last year's. The increase is almost wholly accounted for by increased salaries to teachers in High and Public schools necessitated by present day costs of living.

Durham Won First Semi-final from Sarnia

Playing sterling lacrosse all the way, part of the time fighting an up-hill battle Durham best than doubled the score on Sarnia's best team here on Wednesday.

The count was 9 to 4; in the last half it was 7-0. This against a team of a city of 13,000, who had beat London 15-3 and 25-4, is a score to be proud of, and reveals the calibre of lacrosse Durham is putting up.

In four games this summer Sarnia has scored 84 goals to 14 against them. This first reverse must have been some surprise to them, and Durham's shutting them out in three of the four periods will be recognized as some feat.

Durham opened the scoring 30 seconds after the face-off and missed several good chances in the remaining 19 1/2 min. Quarter time 1-0. Though play was quiet even in the 2nd period, Sarnia ran in four straight goals, and Durham the last before half time. Score Sarnia 4, Durham 2.
