Increased Rates to Railways

The increase of freight and passenger rates that went into effect on Monday last, is rousing sentiment against the Board of Railway Commissioners which granted the melon to the Railways. The wholesale grocers, the U. F. O., Boards of Trade and other bodies, are taking steps to make an urgent appeal against this gift to the railways. As a sample of the raise, the rate on live stock is up from 75c to \$1.25 per head. It is calculated that the increased rates and fares will cost the people of Canada over ten million dollars a month, yet our hybrid government refused to "stay" the increase until an appeal had been made.

They are said to perform some wonderful feats, indicating large intelligence and high training. There will not be an idle minute during the afternoon.

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Fox Farming Established near Dundalk

On the farm of Mr. Jas. Mitchell Continued from last week

Only one definite case of failure to propagate the species has occurred on the Mitchell farm and the unprofitable pair of adults this year will be slaughtered for their pelts. The average litter has been four in number, while some females have given birth to no fewer than seven. Mortality has been low, and such deaths as have occurred have been due to deliberate action on the part of one or other parent, rather than because of irregularities in digestion or similar causes. In the case of one family the female dragged the pups into the open during keen December weather in two successive years, with the result that the entire litter was lost on each occasion.

"Have you any difficulty in securing meat?" I asked, having in mind one of the greatest problems confronting breeders in the Maritime provinces.

"Practically none," was the reply. "I can secure enough dead horses locally to keep me supplied. I buy horses in the autumn, slaughter them, and store the carcasses in an ice-house built for the purpose. These carcasses keep until July, and during the summer months I shoot a great many ground-hogs, which supplement the meat supply very appreciably. I have an idea that the stomach of a fox requires a diet that provides hair and I give them a liberal measure of dead ground-hog skin and all. As in Prince Edward I feed the other essentials, such as milk and fox-biscuits."

Mr. Mitchell does not follow the Prince Edward method of killing by pressure on the heart area, but drowns the animals, believing this to be the most expeditious, as well as the most merciful manner of death. The skins are stretched on the farm, and when thoroughly dried are baled and shipped to St. Louis, U. S. A.

In the future Mr. Mitchell may adopt other schemes of marketing his pelts, the newly-organized Canadian fur-sales market at Montreal affording him an opportunity of personally supervising the actual disposal of his own product. The Mitchell fox ranch is a small one at the moment, but more will be heard from Proton township before many years are past.
