REDUCED TO ASHES... The mortgage was placed on a tray held by two stalwarts of the congregation, Thos. McNiece and Duncan McLean; another stalwart, Allan Bell struck the match and applied it to the document, which for a moment or so seemed loath to "go," but it did go, and in the presence of the pastor and the three named, and in view of the whole company, was reduced to ashes, before the hot tray had burned the fingers of those holding it!

warrior, a tyrant was depicted as we never saw it before. The analysis of his character as his great desire for world-power, developed by notable victories, was superb. He traced his early campaigns, by which continental Europe was at his feet, and great applause was given to his statement that only one power, and that Great Britain, eluded his masterful sway. The campaigns in Spain, and in Egypt undertaken to cripple Britain's power, were among his mistakes, as was that against Russia which cost him 400,000 men. He lost color by these failures and was sent to Elba and his dramatic escape and return to France, which roused all Europe was one of his best pictures, but his masterpiece was his description of the battle of Waterloo, which he had studied on the spot. We leave it at that.

THE SADDLE... The sad story of Josephine, his cruel treatment of her, his arrogant assumption of power as First Consul, and later crowning himself as Emperor though he asked the Pope to be present, were all pictured. His down fall at Waterloo, his surrender to the British, the dark days at St. Helena, and his death in the midst of an un- wanted tropical storm were given in vivid touches.

THE CHARGE... The charge of the Scots Greys at Waterloo, when at a critical moment they rode to death and glory with cries of "Scotland yet," was another climax that brought applause. Still another when it was shown how the Egyptian campaign was frustrated by Nelson at the Nile.

THE LECTURE... The lecturer did justice to Napoleon for studying the arts of peace. He fostered education, built public works, made a code of National justice, encouraged good roads, and did many things that showed greatness apart from war.

REVD. H. HARDY & COLE... His parents were humble people, his only son died young, he stands out alone as a meteor flash upon humanity, who was arrogant enough to say "A man of my calibre cannot commit crimes."
