Here were born thirteen children, nine of whom survive her. They are: Mrs Milne, Dromore; Wm. in Missouri; Christina, nurse; Sarasia; Mrs Waddell, Sperling, Man; Ann, teacher, Holstein; Mrs A Henderson, Dromore; Dr Jas., Iowa; Dr Alex., Calgary; Mrs McEachnie, Hopeville.

Mrs Fettes left the old home a short time after her husband's death, and has been since then with her married daughters but chiefly with her youngest daughter, Mrs McEachnie, where she was when the call came.

The call appeared to com' suddenly, though at the ripe age of 79 years 8 mos. She was taken with a paralytic stroke and did not regain consciousness. Five of her daughters were with her during her six days of illness. The members of the family who were at a distance were summoned but only Dr Jas arrived in time to be with her at the end. Wm. and Mrs Waddell came later.

The funeral took place Nov. 3rd to Mt. Forest cemetery. The service was conducted by Rev Mr Burnett of Dromore, assisted by the Rev Mr. Bell of Hopeville. The former spoke very fittingly on the three great adventures in life,—Birth, Life and Death.

The pall bearers were her two sons, Wm and Dr James, a grandson Alex Milne, and her three sons-in-law, A. Milne, A Henderson and N. McEachnie.

Mrs Fettes was a member of the Presbyterian church was a woman of the finest Christian character and had a most kindly disposition.

She always kept an open door for the stranger, no matter what their station in life. To her family she ever showed a life of unselfishness, ever ready to make sacrifice for them and she always kept before their minds by example and precept the beauty of the life that is lived, that the world may be the better for their sojourn here.

EGREMONT COUNCIL

Council met Nov. 1st, members all present, minutes adopted. The Reeve reported meeting all parties interested in what is known as McDougall's drain, lot 27, con 18. A. S. Cooper Markdale, did the levelling of drain. Arrangements were made with the Reeve of Proton to have the townships share of the digging done as soon as help can be obtained. It was found necessary to add two thirty inch tiles to the east end of the culvert to give sufficient width to the roadway. The Reeve also reported that Mr Cornell of the Dept. of Highways visited with him, making enquiries as to the road improvements in the township. He

stated that all payments made by the Treasurer for road improvement of any kind, including shovelling of snow, purchase of gravel, putting in of tile culverts would be apportioned to the amount of 20 per cent.

Com' McEachern reported approaches to Drury bridge \$184.50; covering for bridge, \$260.00; barring road re bridge \$40; repair of culvert \$1; road improvement \$2; engine on grader \$20; repair and operating grader \$3; gravel 11.21; bonus-wire fence \$127.40; fees \$2.00.

Com' Calder reported repair of bridge \$5; rep of culvert \$20; graveling day's labor E. & P. townline \$91.50; gravel 22.86; adjusting sch. fence, S S No. 3, \$12; bonus wire fence \$43.52; fees \$4.

Com' Allan reported repair of bridge \$40; covering for bridge \$100.90; cutting brush 5.40; shovelling gravel \$21.60; gravel 30.88; bonus wire fence \$10.05; fees \$2.00.

Com' Wilson reported digging ditch \$30; fees \$1, also for services securing timber for Drury bridge, \$1.50.

Wilson—McEachern—That an order be drawn on the Treasurer in favor of Alex Hill to the amount of \$1500 on account, re the Drury bridge. Carried.

Wilson—McEachern—In reference to the communication from R. D. Kilgour, we instruct the Clerk to advise Mr Kilgour that an application has been made to County Council under the provisions of the Municipal Act and amendments thereto re the building of a bridge at lots 15-16, con 5. Carried.

By-law No 893 appointing a place to hold municipal nominations and appointing deputy returning officers and poll clerks was passed, D. R. officers being the same as last year.

Calder—Wilson—That the following accounts be paid: Selectors of Jurors \$9; clerk for stamps and envelopes re tax notices \$21.08; reeve for services re McDougall drain \$6; Members of Council, attendance and mileage \$18.50. Carried.
