The East Elgin Election

U. F. O. Candidate Wins

Never before in Ontario was there such interest taken in a by-election as there was in this. The vacancy was of such long duration, that it was freely charged the government was shivering in fear to face a contest. When a contest had to be brought in they used extraordinary means to win. Premier Meighen visited the riding twice, several other notables accompanied him, one paper had 15 columns of advertising, and evidences of lavish spending of money were abundant. When one considers all this, and that the riding returned a Conservative at every election since 1891, it is evident that a violent change of opinion has taken place, as is shown by a majority of 225 against Stensell, the Conservative candidate.

Nor has the Liberal occasion to glory. Charlton was over 1100 behind and this in spite of help from MacKenzie King, the Liberal leader and other Liberal workers. The result was a blow to Meighen, it is scarcely less to MacKenzie King.

Sydney Smith McDermid, the victor, is a farmer, "a good man, a good neighbor, a good farmer," as one of his chairmen called him. He was not an expert on the platform, he was known only locally, he had no money to squander, but he has been hoisted into power by the force of the movement that gave Ontario a U. F. O. government. He too in the campaign was buttressed by prominent speakers! Hon. Mr. Creger, J. J. Morrison, Barnaby, and by a lady champion, Miss Agnes McPhail, well known here. There is no denying that the last named with her powerful though homely thrusts is a force in a campaign.

Had the government candidate won, a general election might have followed. Now, it is almost certain the government will hang on till 1923 for it goes without saying that 90 per cent of their followers will never get back again. Meanwhile three, perhaps four, 4000 sessions is not to be despised.

Seventieth Anniversary of Trinity Church

The approaching celebration of the 70th anniversary of Trinity Church on Dec. 12 and 13, and the visit of Bishop Farthing of Montreal, a former Rector 35 years ago, prompts one to a reminiscence of state of mind. A short history of Trinity Church parish in this and the next two issues of the Review might be interesting. A generation has passed away since that time.

An account of the first Anglican service in Durham 70 years ago, takes us back to the pioneer days of Canada. At that time the counties of Grey and Bruce comprised the "parish" of the late Venerable Archdeacon Mulholland, whose headquarters were in Owen Sound. He made regular visits to all parts of these two counties where church people were to be found and his description of the first service he conducted in Durham is interesting.

"I do not remember the exact date of my first visit to Durham but it was on a Sunday in November 1850. I went to Durham on the previous Saturday on horseback for there were no roads there for wheels." Owing to the bad state of the roads it took me all day to reach there. The service was held in Mr. Jno. Edge's house near the mill, it being the largest available to be had at the time. The congregation was very large and every apartment of the house was filled with men and women who came many miles through the bush to hear once more the grand old church service they were accustomed to in the old country. Many came from the far back concessions on sleds drawn by oxen, for there were no wagons and few houses in the country at the time, bringing children to be baptized. Among those present on that occasion were a number of families of the Edge's, Blake's, Hopkins', Cutis', Davis', Jones', Moodies and many other families whose names I do not remember. The late George Jackson, the Crown Land Agent and old Mr. Hunter were also present. I was much pleased to see that a very large portion of the congregation had prayer books and joined most heartily in the services. Many of the young men and women came to me after the service to show me the Prayer Books that were given to them by their Rectors in Ireland prior to their leaving for Canada.

We had no instrumental music upon the occasion, but a man whose name I forget, led the singing. I believe he had been a parish clerk in Ireland. He commenced in too high a key, but after a number of attempts which did not seem to disconcert him or the congregation he succeeded in getting the key that suited the voices of the congregation and the singing was most impressive. During the fifty years I have been in Holy Orders, I never heard that grand old Hundredth Psalm sung so heartily as I did at that first church service in Durham.

In the winter time I was able to make my missionary tour in the Counties of Grey and Bruce in a sled, or as it was called the "parson's jumper" and the parson's jumper never left Durham without being well loaded with gifts for myself and family and I never knew who the donors were. In the mission field I then labored in alone there are now twenty two clergymen doing the work of the church."

Pirth; Edward and John Hopkins, Allan Park; Elias Edge, Aberdeen; Mrs. Blake, Hanover; Mrs. Patchell, Dobington; John Moodie, U.S.A.; John Edge U.S.A.; John Hopkins, B.C.

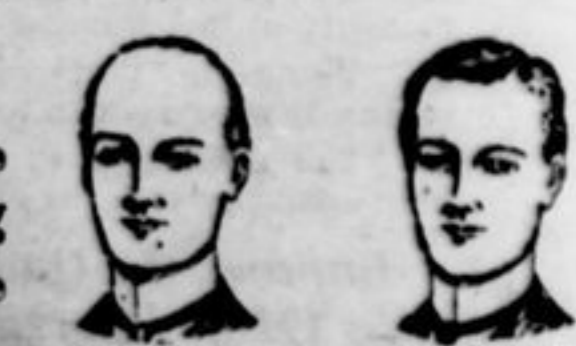
