Foxes Sent To Ontario From Their Island Home

Ranch Started at Priceville, Gray Co., With Ten Pure-bred Pups from Prince Edward Id.

During the summer just ended two staff correspondents of The Globe visited the Maritime Provinces of Canada and each, in his letters from that area paid special attention to the famous fox-breeding industry of Prince Edward Island. Considerable interest was evoked in Ontario by the articles in question, and not a few farmers of this Province expressed themselves as anxious to attempt the domestic breeding of foxes. It has remained for a group of interested individuals in the neighborhood of Priceville, in the county of Grey, to take the initiative, with the result that there now are, in pens in that village, five pairs of pure-bred black foxes from the well-known Jordan Ranch on Prince Edward Island. These ten pups, along with six others that have been placed in pens at Burlington, have come to this Province as a result of the activities of Mr J. M. McGillivray, a prominent dealer and a recognized authority on pelts. To insure the safe delivery of his pups, Mr McGillivray induced Mr W. L. Jordan to accompany the shipment direct from the island to Priceville, and the pens were constructed at the latter place under the direct supervision of this Maritime expert, who claims to be the first Prince Edward fox breeder to transfer part of his ranch activities to the Province of Ontario.

Animals did not mind the Journey. "The pups stood the journey splendidly, and were not off their feed when they arrived at Priceville," Mr Jordan stated to The Globe. "They are housed in what appears to be an ideal spot, and from their contented appearance might still be in their pens on the island." For a time Mr Jordan will oversee the care and feeding of the foxes, and in this work will be assisted by Mr Lauchlan MacTavish, a young man of the village, who has been interested for some months in the rearing of ordinary red foxes such as abound in the hilly areas of St. Grey.

Mr Jordan intimated to The Globe that, in the near future, he may transfer his entire stock of fifty pure-bred black and silver foxes to Ontario; in the meantime his attention will be given to the animals purchased by Mr McGillivray for the ranch at Priceville.

This is not the first importation made by Ontario breeders from the old-established farms on "The Gem of the Gulf." Some few years ago another Grey county farmer, Mr Mitchell of the township of Proton, brought in a pair of Island breeders, and today his pens house between forty and fifty black and silver vulpines. Other black fox farms are located at Grand Valley, Courtwright, Burlington and Alliston, while at least one is to be seen from the train window in a lonely spot along the right-of-way bordering the northern shore of Lake Superior. In a quiet way the industry has been getting a foot-hold, and the next few years may witness many new ventures in the somewhat romantic pursuit of raising foxes for their fur.—Hector McKinnon in the Globe.

Presbyterianism in Priceville for the last 70 Years

It is just 70 years since the first log cabin was put up in this little town, along the Durham Road leading to the town of Durham which was chiefly settled by highland Scotch. The first preacher that came to preach was a highlander and preached to his fellow countrymen in the highland language (not in a church) but in a small log cabin. It was not a flowing sermon but simple gospel truths and the audience listened eagerly to the simple discourse. The old mothers and fathers, rejoiced that they were privileged to hear a portion of the good book expounded to them which probably they did not hear since they left the highlands of Scotland from that noted divine, the late Dr Norman McLeod.

But as the years passed by service began to be more frequent and in 1860 the late Rev Chas. Cameron was ordained in the Free Church, Here we had to contend with two Presbyterian churches, the old Kirk and the Free Church and to see them going to their different places of worship, meeting each other on the way, one would think by their actions they had a different Master to serve. Mr Cameron resigned in 1875 in view of the proposed union.

In 1857 the late Rev. John Goodwill, a student, preached to the old kirk people and in 1858 a Rev Charles James Cameron preached for the summer months. Mr Cameron was author of Hymn 347 in the old Book of Praise. He died in Bombay, India, in August 1867.

The late Rev. Donald Fraser was ordained as minister of the old church of Scotland and served till 1875 a good place for the approaching union. Mr Fraser died in Victoria, B. C. The Rev Alex McKenzie served for a couple of years in the Free Church, and the well known Rev. Dr McGillivray of Bonar Church, Toronto, served as a student in the old Kirk during the summers of 1875 and 1876, preaching both Gaelic and English. Mr McGillivray's first text was in Gaelic "Faoch usin De thanig thoir air falbh peoshanin an teaghail" or "Behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world." This will remind Mr McGillivray of the passing of time and the many changes in forty five years.

Now we come to the vexed question. The proposed union was held in St Andrews Church in the winter of 1877 and some of the old heads of both congregations seemed to lament giving up their different churches in lieu of the new name to be proposed. It was quite amusing to listen to two old veterans of both churches. Old Jim of the old Kirk proposed the united church to be called St. Andrew's, but old Rory interrupted him by telling him to hold his peace and proposed the united church to be called St Paul's. Both seemed to give expression to the words "If I forget thee O Jerusalem, let my right hand forget her cunning." But a quiet member who was listening proposed the united church to be called St Columba and it was carried unanimously.

Now comes the choosing of a minister and the late Rev Donald McLeod received the unanimous support of the whole congregation and labored faithfully for nineteen years till called to fill a higher position on the 20th February, 1897. His remains are resting in the old cemetery and although dead yet speaks.

On the 28th March 1898, the Rev. John A Matheson was chosen to fill the vacancy laboring faithfully for twenty years and nine months when he received a call to his present congregation at Mono Mills.

On the 15th May 1919, the present pastor, Rev. Mr Jones, was called to fill the vacancy and those that have long passed the meridian of life cannot expect to see Mr Jones in his 21st year as pastor of St Columba church. But all the same we wish him to see that far away date 1940 as pastor.

It will be remembered that two languages had to be contended with, Gaelic and English, until Mr Matheson resigned. Those who patronized the old language are mostly all gone and the young generation in general are after forsaking the language of their forefathers.

In the summer of 1888 the present commodious church was erected by the Watson brothers of Egremont, and some ten years ago the commodious sheds were erected, being one of the finest sheds this side of Toronto, all concrete, so that those worshipping comfortably in their own church will be pleased to know that their dumb animals are comfortable also.

Swiss on Park is another station and we would like to see some one from there give an historical sketch as we don't know much about the congregation. The first elders of Priceville church are all gone, being Arch. McEide, John MacLachlan, Allan Osm ton, Arch McDonald, Dugald McLeas, Dugald McCormick, Allan McLeas, John Stewart, Thos Binnie,
