DEPUTY-REEVE ACQUITTED.—The trial of Deputy-reeve Hugh McLean of Collingwood township, which has aroused a great deal of interest throughout Grey County, was brought to a close Friday afternoon, at the General Sessions of the Peace, in Owen Sound, when the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty on three counts.

The first was a charge of arson, the second one of defrauding the Farmer's Mutual Fire Insurance Co. of the insurance on the house, and the third that of defrauding the same Company of the insurance on the contents. The verdict was that of not guilty on all the counts. Mr McLean has the reputation throughout the Township of Collingwood of which he is the Deputy Reeve of being an honest and straightforward young man, and after the evidence was all in there was little doubt in the minds of those who had listened to the whole case as to his innocence, and the verdict was no surprise to them. The trial lasted for nearly two days and the jury were out about two hours. The McLean house was burned Oct. 3rd, 1917.
