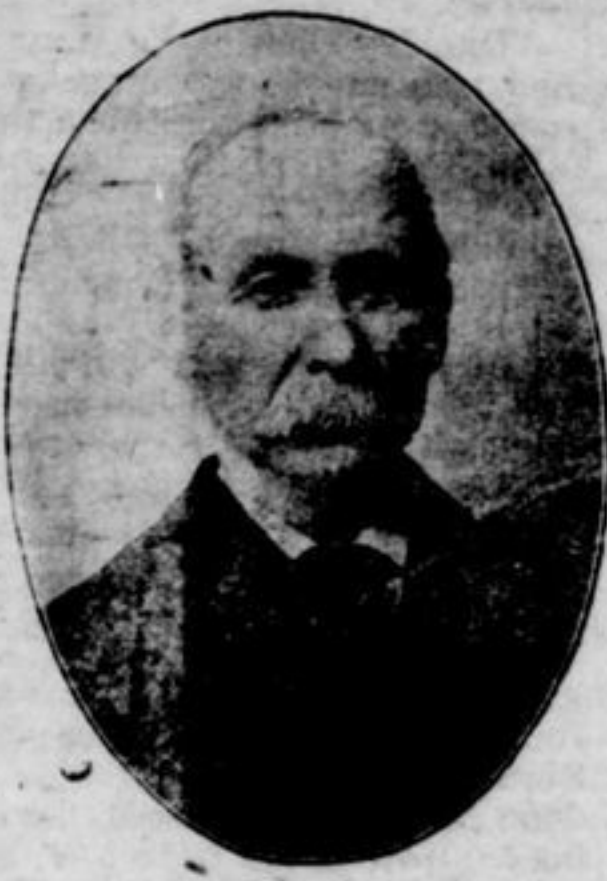

WANT MUNICIPAL PHONE.—Farmers residing on the 10th and 12th concession of north Glenelg have a project on foot whereby they hope to fill a long felt want in their community by installing a new telephone system. If their plans are carried out, it will be a township enterprise and will have Markdale for central. It is understood a commission has been appointed to look up data as to costs, materials, &c, and have even purchased equipment from the old power plant at Hayward's Falls. However it is pointed out that before it will become a municipal project, debentures will have to be issued and this would possibly entail an electoral vote.

Home Nursing & First Aid Course

A Home Nursing and First Aid Course, conducted by the Department of Agriculture, and under the auspices of the Durham branch of the Women's Institute, will be held in Durham from January 4 to 14, inclusive. Acclamation in Durham

The nominations here Monday passed off quietly, with an entire absence of "fireworks" such as has marked similar meetings in some recent years. Retiring Mayor Grant was again nominated but retired, leaving Mr Thos Allan mayor for 1921 by acclamation. Reeve Calder was again nominated and no other name being presented he also is reeve by acclamation and the same has to be said of the retiring trustees—Messrs R. Aljoe, H. Allan, J. P. Hunter and of the Hydro Commissioner—Mr Geo. Kress who was again re-elected.

The following 18 names were presented for the Council: Messrs Wm Lawrence, Thos Whitmore, John Backus, John McQueen, Grant McComb, Arthur McClocklin, Thos. Scari, Jos. Fith, Dr. Smith, Arnold Noble, Jas. Lloyd, J. C. Adams, S. P. Saunders, Robt McLean, J. H. Harding, R. E. Richardson, J. A. Rowland, Wm A McDonald.

Of these the following six qualified and are elected by acclamation: John C. Adams, James Lloyd, Wm McDonald, John McQueen, S. P. Saunders, Dr J. L. Smith.
