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EGREMONT COUNCIL

Council met January 10, pursuant to statute. Members elected subscribed to the Declaration of Office and took their seats as members of the Council for the year 1921.

Reeve—John McArthur, Councillors—Alexander Allan, Neil Calder, Allan McDougald and Robert J. Wilson.

The Reeve addressed the Council regarding the work of the year and asked the co-operation of each member of the Council.

Comr. Wilson reported Geo. Lane, drawing title to Townline, Egremont and Proton, and repairing culvert, \$3; Hugh McKinnon, bonus wire fence, \$24.70.

Allan—Wilson—That, the Township be divided into the same Divisions as last year, with the exception that Comr. McDougald take Mr. McEachern's division.

The Treasurer was instructed to pay an additional \$300 of the General School Grant for payments of teachers' salaries to the different School Sections for the year 1920.

The Clerk was instructed to order seven copies of the Municipal-World for use of the members of Council, Clerk and Treasurer.

Councillor Allan was instructed to examine the Registry Office re the Treasurer's sureties and report at next meeting of Council.

The Reeve and Clerk were authorized to sign and submit to the Minister of Public Works and Highways of the Province of Ontario the petition of the Corporation of the Township of Egremont showing that during the period April 12 to December 31 there has been expended upon the township roads the sum of \$12,705.15, and requesting the statutory grant on that amount as provided by the Ontario Highways Act and amendments thereto.

Kindly allow me a little space to express my thanks to the electors of the Township of Egremont for the increased support given me at the polls, Monday, 3rd January last.

Although not elected, the voice of the people of the township apart from Polling sub-division No 3 gave evidence that the policy adopted by the council of 1920 to promote the general improvement of our highways in all parts of the municipality, was acceptable to the electors.

The election of Mr. A. McDougall was expected, there being no other candidates in that part of the township for some years past and it was no easy task to determine which of the members of the 1920 council would be left. At last election Mr J. R. Wilson of Boothville was one vote behind Mr McEachern: this time he is one ahead. Such are the fortunes of war.

The two "Me's" are given leave of absence until the bugle calls again for duty. Their seats will be filled by two other "Me's", good officers of the squadron, whose silver locks like those they replace will add dignity to their presence.

The writer has much to thank Egremont for in the past and the welfare of the township will ever be foremost in my thoughts.

It is now fifty years since the council of Egremont, unsolicited, appointed me to office and during the past half century have filled nearly every position in the gift of the municipality as well as that of the people.

During the past year the members of Council gave freely of their time to public service, even when forced for lack of help to neglect their duties on the farm. This was especially the case with Mr Gilbert McEachern who had the oversight of two bridges. To attend to them he had to be absent from home the greater part of his time.

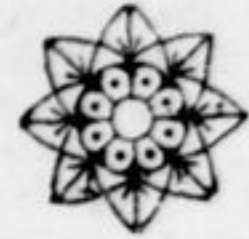

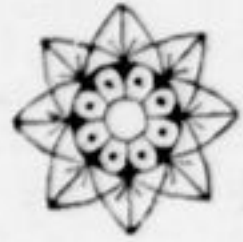
