Durham Hockey Teams win 2, lose 2, during Week

Durham 9, Chesley 8

Chesley's fast senior team opened the Northern League season here Thursday night and gave the Durhams a strenuous argument, being defeated by only one goal, 9-8. At the outset the pace was speedy, the defence goallight and shot after shot was cleared by Draper at Chesley goal. After 20 min the visitors had placed 1 in Allen's nets to 0 for Durham. The locals uncovered some effective team play in the second period and outscored Chesley 4 to 1, giving them a 2 goal lead. The last session saw the fireworks. In the first five minutes Durham had run in 3 more, making it 7-2, and it looked all over but cheering. The visitors recovered themselves and retaliated with 3, bringing it up to 7-5 Durham made it 8-5, Chesley then 8-6, and to clinch it Durham added the ninth, 9-6. Chesley undaunted kept pressing making it 9-7 and then 9-8 just before time was called.

In the Northern only one sub. is allowed and Durham's close call was accentuated by lack of condition. With little opportunity to get in shape the fast pace was telling on the Durhams at the close, when the forward line required frequent subs. Chesley with ice for 3 weeks, was in shape to maintain the first clip to the limit and this almost assured them victory. In all, however it was a grand game to witness, and the spectators received good value. Whitten of Harriston refereed fairly.

Durham 3, Owen Sound 2

It was a glorious opening that Durham staged in her first season in the Ontario Hockey Association when they "carried off the bacon" right in the city of Owen Sound by a score of 3-2 last Friday night. And this on top of a hard game here with Chesley the night previous. Owen Sound like Durham, has had little ice previously this season. They had but one practice while Durham had little more—the Chesley game in addition to a practice.

Weather conditions favored the use of cars for the trip to the Scenery City and 8 or 9 carried the team and supporters. Whether on or off the ice, the boys were accorded the best of treatment by the home team and rooters, who applauded a fine play or a score by either team. After a strenuously fought game the boys have pleasant memories of the evening and assure the city team sportsmanlike treatment on their visit here. The referee was R. H. (Tod) Grant of Toronto, who was well known as a lad in Durham when visiting his grandmother, Mrs. J. H. Hunter. "Tod" gave complete satisfaction and remarked it was as clean a match as he had ever witnessed.

To Ernie McDonald in goal. O. Sound ascribes the main credit for the Durham victory. He never played a better game in the nets, making many phenomenal saves. The McLachlan-Farrel defence, the equal of any in the district, also played a big part. Farrel on one occasion single handed blocked a 3 man rush, by side-checking the first, bodychecking next and then with a poke check captured the puck from the third. It was quick work. McNamara with his raised speedy shots, secured Durham's first two goals and A. Saunders, the winning center just two minutes before full time. Severely Injured in Sawmill Accident

While working in McArthur Bros. sawmill on 2nd Con. E. G. R. Glenelg, on the Reay farm, Neil Black received a deep cut on the head by a saw, which it is feared may end fatally. He was taking an edging off the belt when he raised his head unthinkingly against a rapidly revolving saw cutting it open from ear to ear about two inches in depth. The cut penetrated the brain, and though still living, to-day, Wednesday, at a small house near the mill, but little hope is entertained that he will recover.

The victim of the accident is a son of Mr. Joseph Black, who resides in Holland Tp. He is in his thirties and unmarried. Drs. Smith of town and McCullough of Markdale dressed the wound the latter attending on him.

Mr. Cooper, District Representative, presided and Mr. Robbins, who has the oversight of our Garrafrua Road from Guelph to Owen Sound explained the heroic attempt of the government to maintain about 1800 miles of Provincial Highways by similar sub-divisions, each under a competent Manager or Overseer as is Mr. Robbins.

As one listened to the details of the scheme, one is impressed with the business like way the U. F. O. government has gone about it. Time and space forbid further mention this week.
