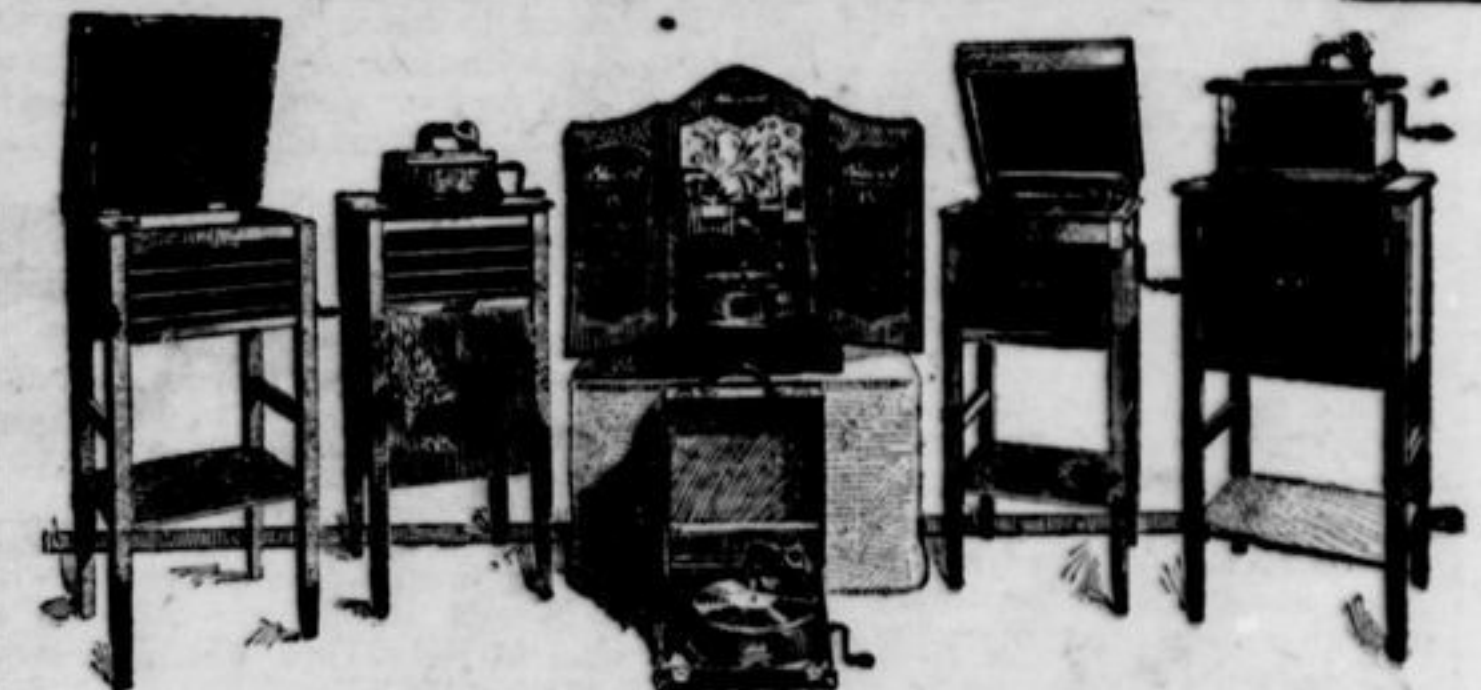

John Deline, who had been sentenced to 18 mos. in the Ontario Reformatory on two charges of theft, and was in O. Sound jail awaiting removal, made a slippery escape from the Court House where he was engaged carrying papers to the Sheriff's office. He beat it out unnoticed, skipped around the side walls, and hit it over the east hill to the railway track. When his escape was discovered there was no trace of him, but the officers surmised he would be around his girl's home near Dornoch. He was located in an empty barn on the 2nd con, Bentinck, and taken into custody. An additional six month's sentence was imposed, now two years, as penalty for his daring attempt for liberty.
