**Honors to Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Meads**

Hon. John Oliver Premier of British Columbia, also present

All roads led to the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Meads, old Durham Road, Armesia, on Monday night. Neighbors and friends for miles around and a few from more distant points assembled, the purpose being to give the hosts a piece of their mind (and some other things) before they left the district that has known them for over 50 years, to reside in the village of Flesherton.

The night being somewhat chilly an outdoor function could not be staged, so the guests on arrival were welcomed inside, until the roomy residence was crowded to overflowing with a hearty jolly crowd, who in greatest good humor elbowed and squeezed from room to room or from guest to guest.

After an hour of informal and reminiscent talk, Rev. C. Sinclair Jones of Priceville, called for order and in the midst of a packed room, having got in front of him Mr. and Mrs. Meads, read an address breathing sentiments of deep seated respect and tender regards to the worthy pair, who were soon to leave for a new home in a neighboring village. The address set out the worthy part they

each had taken in the development of the community, spoke of the interest Mr. Meads had taken in the work of the field of social reform all crowned with the gift of the highest position in his township. Mr. Meads knew of the gathering as a kind of good bye affair but the presentation part came as a surprise. However he made a very suitable reply, expressing the pleasure himself and wife had had in the many years around him. He disclaimed many of the kind things said about him but thanked them most warmly for the handsome gift (a splendid and useful hanging lamp and brackets) assuring them that as long as he could see the sight of it would remind him of the friends of the old Durham Road. He received hearty applause. The chairman then called on an old friend, Dr. Hutton of Durham, who in well chosen remarks paid tribute to the worth of the couple just honored. The community in honoring them had honored itself. In his long residence among them he had learned to appreciate them as citizens and fellow workers in church and elsewhere. He was also glad to meet for the first time, Mrs. Mead's distinguished brother, Hon. John Oliver, Premier of British Columbia to see if the high impressions of him formed by his wife on a chance railway journey together were

justified! A sally greeted with applause Mr. Thos. Nichol ex-reeve of Glenelg was delighted to be present to join in the felicitations to worthy friends and the pleasure of meeting and greeting "Honest John Oliver". Rev. Mr. McCarty of Priceville, added his word of commendation to the high qualities of Mr. and Mrs. Meads, ever in the front of every good work. Mr. Thurston of the Flesherton Advance, disagreed with the part of the address voicing regret at their departure, for it was going to be a joy to him and his fellow citizens of Flesherton to welcome them to the civic life of the village! Mr. C. Ramage, Durham said he had admired the public spirit Mr. Mead had shown in pushing Priceville Show and other ways, thought it was an inspiration to young men to have amongst them one who by native merit and few early advantages had risen to be Premier of a Canadian Province. He also felicitated the Premier's father in his 88th year being able to join in the welcome to his distinguished son. Lastly the Premier was called upon and his lucid speech revealed some of the qualities that had enabled him to rise step by step to the highest position. After a few delightful pleasantries in opening he spoke of the pleasure such a meeting had given him, never he said in all his previous visits had he noted such progress in material things in that district, as he had on this occasion. He rejoiced in the evidences of prosperity among them evidences seen in almost all parts of Canada.

He then spoke of his own province and in graphic touches he outlined its vast natural resources, its immense forests, its big trees, its fruit and farming possibilities now fast developing, its fisheries, scarcely surpassed anywhere. Its great ocean inlets, some of them 100 miles long, its mountains, its mines, climate, &c leaving an impression of the Pacific province as no reading of books could give. He was heartily applauded. Mr. Oliver has been at Ottawa on Provincial business, and was as far east as Halifax. After a few days with his father and brothers and sisters in Armesia he leaves about the end of the week for British Columbia. Mention must be made of the splendid lunch provided and enjoyed thoroughly despite the crowded condition of the whole house; also the fine violin and organ music, which seems abundant in the district. Then was ever the sword dance done in such crowded surroundings; and done well too by graceful Miss McDonald. This broke the ice so to speak and lovers of the terpsichorean art in polka, schottische or round dance came in for their innings as the crowd grew thinner in the morning hours.
