Rob Roy Mills Limited
 Bruce County Council was in session at Kincardine last week. They decided to devote a great deal more time to maintenance work during the near future, and less to construction. The bridge at Chesley will be rebuilt at a cost of about \$20,000. Owing to heavy additional expenditure the county of Bruce tax rate will be 12 1/2 mills—the heaviest that it ever has been. Supt. Izzard of the Road System, tendered his resignation but was given a raise of \$500 in his salary and was induced to reconsider his action.
