Courses

School Boards to Make Selection of Optional Subjects

The changes that have been made in the high school courses of study as a result of the study given the matters here by special committee on high school education have been announced by Hon. R H. Grant, and are being communicated to school boards principals and others affected. The changes are so important as to affect a revolution in high school education and to give the high and continuation schools an entirely new status in the educational system of the province. Briefly, the aim of the department has been to provide a five year course of training that will be an end in itself intead of a step either to university or Normal school work. Hitherto the training given in the schools has had either or both of these as an objective and the student who wished to round off his education by a high school course was obliged to take all the subjects required for university or Normal school matriculation. Under the new system matriculation is still provided for, but by the adoption of the optional system, applied to all but a few subjects, the student can take the instruction he

A feature of the plan is that the option lies with school boards to decide which of the optional courses will be provided, and this will permit the boards to arrange the courses in a way to meet the particular needs of the school or district.

Such a radical change necessarily in-volved a radical change in the examination system, and hereafter the student will be permitted to write on an examination in one or more subjects at the year end when he complete that subject. On obtaining 50 per cent of the marks assigned to that paper the student will be given a certificate of standing. It will not be necessary to get an aggregate percentage as in the past. The value of this change is that the student will not have to carry on in all the subjects in order to be ready for final examinations.

The courses of study have been divided into three sections; a lower school course of two years, a middle school course of two years, and an upper school course
