A POSTAGE RATE RAISE—An advance of one cent per ounce is announced in the letter postage rate between Canada and other parts of the Empire. The former rate was two cents per ounce, with an added one cent as war tax. The new rate will be three cents an ounce, with one cent as war tax additional. The postage rate to foreign countries has been increased from five cents for the first ounce and three cents for each succeeding ounce, to 10 cents for the first ounce and five cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof. The postage rates within Canada and to the United States and Mexico remains at three cents for the first ounce and two cents for each additional ounce.
