# PRICEVILLE AND VICINITY

**PRICEVILLE VILLAGE**

The latest covered sidewalks during the last several days rendered walking somewhat dangerous. Mrs. T. A. Ferguson fell at the Standard Bank corner on Thursday of last week and has been suffering for several days from the shock and bruises.

Mrs. Mary McArthur who has been suffering from paralysis for a number of weeks, passed away on Tuesday night, Nov. 22nd, aged 70 years. She and her son James who is a C. P. R. employee, lived at the old home on Elgin St. Her husband Alex McArthur predeceased her several years ago. When she became helpless her only daughter, Mrs. Dobson of Toronto, came up and carefully cared for the mother. The three sons Archie, James and John were also kind attendants at the sick bed. The funeral took place on Friday, 25th inst, Rev. C. S. Jones conducting the service at the house and grave, assisted by Rev. Mr. McCarter.

Mr. Robt. Fisher, an old resident of S. Glenelg, passed away on Wednesday night, Nov. 23rd, aged 77 years. He was unmarried and retired from farming last year and on the Saturday previous to his death, he went to help Mr. Alex McDonald, Dromore, with his barn work. He took ill on Sunday with erysipelas in the head and died Wednesday night. The funeral on Saturday took place from the residence of his sister and brother-in-law, Mr. Donald McDonald, 19th con, Proton, to the new public cemetery here. Rev. C. S. Jones conducted the service at residence and grave.

**PRICEVILLE AND LIMITS**

The funeral of Mrs. Alex McArthur took place to the old cemetery here on Friday, 25th Nov., after a prolonged illness of some months from anaemia. Mrs. McArthur was one of the pioneers of this place where she spent her youthful days. She was a consistent member of the Baptist Church here being immersed by the late Rev. Robt. McIntyre. Mrs. McArthur was always noted for her kind disposition and always ready to assist in her services was needed. Her husband died many years ago and since has been well attended to by her sons, who are now lamenting a kind and dutiful mother. The funeral procession was a testimony of the respect she was held in the community, air off and near at hand. The pall bearers were six middle aged men. Rev. Jones and McCarter conducted the funeral obsequies and the casket was covered with flowers from friends and relatives.

The funeral took place from his brother-in-law's place, Mr. D. McDonald, Proton, where the remains were taken after his death. Rev. Mr. Jones preached an able sermon from the 14th of John, "Let not your hearts be troubled." The troubles of this life are numerous but why do we trouble if we have the assurance of being the recipients of those beautiful mansions when we pass from the scene of action in this life. Mr. Jones closed his remarks urging all his hearers to be prepared to meet their God when the call comes. The remains were buried in McNeal's cemetery, the pall bearers being six of his nearest neighbors.

Mr. Fisher leaves to mourn his death three sisters and one brother. The sisters are Mrs. Chas. McArthur, Durham Rd., Glenelg; Mrs. Williams of the Bosc; and Mrs. D. McDonald from the Bosc. The funeral was held at W. G. Watson's, and he had 3 funerals in succession from Friday to Sunday.

The last is Mrs. Campbell, an aged lady of Proton, and grandmother of the candidate, Miss Agnes McPhee's. But as the latter is out of our own territory, will not say any more.

24 miles of good roads have been constructed, 8 miles broken stone, 16 of gravel consolidated.

Mr. J. W. Hunt has constructed 3 bridges from 10 ft. to 16 ft. and 21 bridges 12 ft. to 9 ft. in size on Road No. 65, Bentinck and Normanby 27 Glenelg. Mr. Alec Hill built one bridge 70 ft cement arch on Road No. 24, Bentinck.
