A disastrous fire occurred between 2 and 3 a. m. Wednesday in the village of Dundalk. It started in a frame building occupied as a garage, and adjoining it was the Dundalk Herald printing office. Both were quickly in flames and nothing could be saved. Mimms' tailor shop and the Oddfellows' lodge room in same building were also burned down although some of the stock was saved.

The Dundalk Herald printing office was also destroyed. The Herald lost a new Linotype machine, presses and the whole plant, which is now a heap of junk. We sympathize with Bro. Macintyre in this heavy loss, this being his third fire.

Dr. E. Coultis of Agincourt Appointed Superintendent

Dr. E. N. Coultis, for a number of years a leading physician of Scarborough has been appointed Superintendent of the Freeport Sanatorium, Preston, and has left here to take up his new duties.

On the eve of their departure from the village Dr and Mrs Coultis were tendered a public reception in Knox Church and on behalf of the community, presented with a cabinet of silver. The presentation was made by Reeve James T. Stewart and Mrs R. M. Loveless.

For the past 15 years Dr Coultis has played a prominent part in the affairs of the township. He took a keen interest in education and was largely responsible for the building of the present school in Agincourt and the formation of the Agincourt Public Library of which he was the first President.

During the war Dr Coultis served in the Royal Army Medical Corps at Gallipoli and Egypt.

(Dr Coultis is a brother of Mrs Dr. Farquharson, while Mrs Coultis was formerly Miss Jean Ireland, a former resident of Durham.)
