King Government Firmly in Saddle
The ministers of the new government at Ottawa who went back for re-election have all been returned by acclamation. For a few days it looked as if Premier King was to be an exception, for W. A. Armstrong, the Conservative candidate defeated

on Dec. 6th, came boldly to the front, almost demanding from his party the liberty to run again, "to vindicate his reputation" somewhat sullied in the few days before the election. The two of them were actually nominated, but Mr. Armstrong in time with drew and Hon. Mr. King was declared elected by acclamation, as were the rest of his colleagues.

The only government candidate still without a seat is Mr. Stewart of Alberta, so far no candidate of that province, having retired to give him a place. It is now thought that a vacancy in Quebec, caused by death may be proffered to him.

Meanwhile all eyes are now on Greenville, where Mr. Meighen is being opposed by a Progressive, with just a chance that he may again be defeated. Among the speakers holding out for the Progressive candidate is Miss A. McPhail, M. P., who disclaims for herself and party any unkindness because opposing him, but that the country having turned him down, he is looked upon as fair game. Hon. Mr. King, we suspect, would rather see him elected.

An Active Politician
Miss McPhail, M. P., has been using all the prestige of her name and the valley of a woman representative in carrying the war into Africa, that is in entering into the Greenville contest with the endeavor to elect another Progressive and defeat ex Premier Meighen. Her meetings are crowded, the Ottawa citizen gives about two columns to a report of a famous speech she made at Prescott. Some of the material of her speech we have heard here but much of it is new, and shows we think a development taking place. She is going to visit Ottawa before returning home. The election is to-day.

Two weeks ago in Winnipeg, she also won laurels at a Progressive Convention. Not only was she in demand as a speaker but receptions were held in her honor as the pioneer of women in parliamentary life. The new member for South East Grey is bringing her riding into prominence and she is showing an energy in preliminary stages which if duplicated in parliament will react on wholesome legislation.

Canadian Authors
Versus Old Erin.
Canadian Greys' I O D E. had a very choice night on Tuesday. It was held by courtesy of the management in the lecture room of the Presbyterian Ch. and there was a good attendance.

The opening ceremonies were carried out on I. O. D. E. procedure and the program was enriched by an instrumental solo by Miss Rita Irwin, solo by Mrs. C. H. Danard and three elocutionary numbers, grouped, from the works of Service and Henry Drummond and given by Mr. E. De-McCloskin. These selections were aptly chosen and as usual well rendered. Mrs. Gilbert McKechnie, Regent, presided efficiently.

The chief attraction of the evening was Mrs. W. Ruttle of Hanover who was to deal with Canadian authors and did in part, but her topic was "Canadian Authors from an Irish standpoint" and the Irish part was both prominent and pleasing. Mrs. Ruttle is of Irish birth an enthusiastic admirer of the Emerald Isle though she admits recent happenings there make it "a good place to live out of." She gave a sketch of early Irish literature, bringing out that the beauty of a country affects its literature and she stressed the point that all young people should cultivate love of country and she was sure the natural beauties of Canada must in time provide a literature to be proud of.

Again referring to the turbulence in Ireland, she said religion was not at the bottom of the trouble but rather hatred of England, and she can tell some gruesome stories of the dangers loyalists have to suffer.

She places the first start of Canadian Literature with Major Richardson about 1840, and says that Canadian literature is purer than that of most countries including our neighbors to the South. Nothing of recent years has touched the English heart like Col. McCrae's "In Flanders Fields."

Mrs. Ruttle has a vein of humor which aids in her portrayal. She got close attention and hearty applause as well as a vote of thanks. Thanks were also given to the Session for use of basement and to all who assisted in the program. Several comments were made complimentary to the lecture, notably by Rev. W. H. Smith, whose summing up was admirable.

God Save the King closed the meeting. Mrs. Ruttle has jurisdiction over Grey and Bruce in the Girl Guide movement and from her local company in Hanover, the uniform throughout Canada has been adopted for this movement.

Borrowers are allowed one new book on a card and not more than two new books to one family at one time irrespective of how many cards the family may have. New books may be retained 10 days only and after that a 2c a day fine will be imposed. Other books may be retained at most three weeks. After that 2c a day fine will be imposed. Non-fiction may be renewed at the end of three weeks for one week longer, providing no other borrower has made inquiry for the book. A number of book borrowers at present have books out from 2 mos. to 2 years. This condition of affairs will not be tolerated hereafter. These borrowers will be given until Feb. 15th to get their books returned. After that date bills for the price of the books retained will be sent to each borrower and if necessary collection made as the law stipulates.
