Safe Once More! Durham Has Now a Constable. At the Town Council meeting on Monday, all were present but Mr Calder whose threatened illness was a cause of deep regret. After passing of the minutes the usual batch of accounts were handed in and passed on by the Finance Com. Councillor Lloyd acting as chairman pro tem.

Letters were read by the Mayor from Municipal Associations, asking Durham to join them with a view to strengthening them in guarding Municipal interests. One of them asked \$10 as a joining fee, the other \$25. Both were laid on the table.

Not so another request asking Durham's acquiescence in such a change in the law as would turn police court fines into the municipal treasury, instead of that of the province. Assent to this was readily given.

The quarterly grant of \$200 to the Public Library was also passed. There were three applications for constable considered in committee of the whole. The by-law passed at last meeting fixing the constables salary at \$250 00 had to be and was rescinded to meet the new applications which called for \$300. The applicants were H. A. Falconer, Wodehouse and Thos. Daniels the former receiving the majority of votes and getting the appointment. The by-law appointing was carried accordingly.

Application was made by Mr Howard McDonald for a license to establish another pool-room in town. The principle of pool-rooms having been admitted the council could do nothing but grant the license, though much of the best thought in town would rather see both on the scrap heap. The new pool-room will occupy a section of the Middaugh House.
