Joe Sr., in his 97th year and to convey to those bereaved over deep sympathy and prayer in this, their great loss. And to assure them further that we deeply appreciate and greatly value his earnest and honored life. And we further desire to pay large tribute to the memory of one who loved his King and Country devotedly, having served under the King's colors in the Rebellion of 1837. Being converted to God early in life he was enabled to live a life of great industry, sobriety, honesty and great worth. He truly loved God and was a good neighbor and sought to do by others as he would be done by.

Forty years ago he carried on revival meetings in Egremont from spring until snow fell. These meetings were productive of great good and many were blessed thereby and to them his memory is precious for not a few are living still.

He was an unusually long and useful life and to the very last he retained all his faculties. His memory of things long since passed and things of more recent date was very keen. His mental workings were very clear and remarkably quick. After being but a few days confined to his bed he slept his last earthly sleep "and was not for God took him."
