Alex McPherson, of the 10th, Con. Proton, kept count of the eggs from his eighteen Plymouth Rock hens for the nine months of 1921 ending on Sept. 30th. The total showed 242 dozen valued at \$78.

Hockey News of the Week

Owen Sound took first Semi-Final

In the tightest and speediest hockey game here this season, Durham Juniors suffered their first loss, when O. Sound "Greys" won by 2 goals to 1. The visitors are the heaviest and fastest Junior bunch seen here, but they were forced to travel the limits to overcome the aggressive Durham lads. No better exhibition of goal tending could be desired, both net guardians blocking dozens of shots. Mountain if anything did the more sensational work, as he cleared 3 or 4 shots directly in front of the nets. York scored Durham's only goal in first period with a speedy lift while O. Sound's two came in the second frame, the last one being scooped in after dropping in front of the nets. Durham boys then made a determined bid to tie in last period but couldn't get past the Sounders husky defence pair, who play close together and have speed to burn.

The Durham forward lined up some great individual stuff but couldn't get such effective team work in action as in the district games. When they shot which was often, Armstrong and his ample padding filled half the nets. Near the close an unusual incident occurred when Hicks, the Owen Sound Club secretary, ran out on the ice to referee "Slim" Mercer of Markdale, claiming a Durham player had tripped one of the Greys and demanding him penalized. Mercer stated it was no trip, the man had fallen over his stick whereupon Hicks called him a liar. The referee swung his arm and knocked him away, and a fracas seemed probable with O. Sound players threatening and Durham spectators rushed on the ice. However things were quieted down and play went on, all agreeing that Hicks got his just deserts for his impudent action and words. Mercer referred fairly throughout and very little missed his eyes.

The return game takes place in Owen Sound Friday night and the Durham boys have good hopes that on larger ice they can pull off a victory. The Owen Sound team are treated as possible O. H. A. champions and the Durham's splendid game against them last night, is a credit to the team and the town.

Won an Up-Hill Fight
Durham High School team beat Mt. Forest 5-4 last Friday after a stiff contest all the way to overcome an early lead. Each team has now won their two home games and a sudden death game will be played in Harrison next week to decide the victors.

Mt. Forest ran up a 3-0 score in first period but Durham came back with 2 in 2nd, still one goal behind. There is a scuffle in front of Durham goal, Snell accidentally knocked in the puck giving the visitors a 4-2 lead. The blues now showed their mettle by running in 3 straight goals and pulling the game out of the fire. The tying goal was the prettiest one of the night when Snell wriggled through the whole team and scored. It was a splendid game to watch marked only by the incapacity of Referee Cowan of Mt. Forest, who gave the breaks to his home team and made a poor list of it generally.
