"During the past week I found that three separate schools in the township of Glenelg, Grey county, received a larger grant than the nine public schools in figures out that this Minister of Education believes in paying for the education of 39 Roman Catholic children in Glenelg \$2,069.30 and for 143 public school pupils \$1,938.88, or for a Roman for \$51.82 and does out for Protestant public schools \$12.99 per child. These figures were obtained from the Township Treasurer."

#### Rev. Dr. Farquharson Congratulates Durham Congregation

A recent letter from Rev. Dr. Farquharson at St. John, N.B., contains some observations which we make bold to publish. Many old friends will appreciate his opinion of current world events:  
"History moves rapidly after a time of strain such as we have passed through. The problem facing every country in the world, excepting perhaps the United States, is that of preserving its honor by paying its debts. The struggle will reveal both the best and the worst of our My hope is that the former will prevail, a belief in which I have never ceased to hope; the Lord reigneth."  
Poor Ireland has longed for the wind, there seems a danger lest she now reap the whirlwind. The doctrine so long preached against the British rule, that every one was warranted in using any kind of weapon to destroy it, is in danger of being used against themselves. Should Collins have a majority in the South, there is no assurance that the minority will stick to constitutional methods in opposing him. My hope has been that Ulster would join the Free State and the loyal element in the north join to strengthen the kindred element in the south. That does not seem likely to be realized in the near future.  
I have been reading Col. Repington's diaries during the war time. They are a great disclosure of the state of feeling throughout the world during those trying years. He is very critical of Lloyd George and the War cabinet. That no side before we would pronounce a judgment on them, but it is no doubt absolutely correct as revealing the state of mind among a large number of leading people at the time. One wonders how the prime minister held out amid such a storm.  
I got the congregational report in due time. Many thanks. The financial position of the congregation is excellent. Congratulations. A steady tug will in due time wipe out the mortgage. The electric blower is a great boon to have and I am not at all surprised that there was danger of injuring the organ from the old method of 'raising the wind'.  
We wish the new government all success. Their problem is a heavy one and if they have something to say that is worth while by March 8th, they will do well. More than government is needed to bring us through. You remember Goldsmith's line "But small the ills that human laws can either cause or cure."

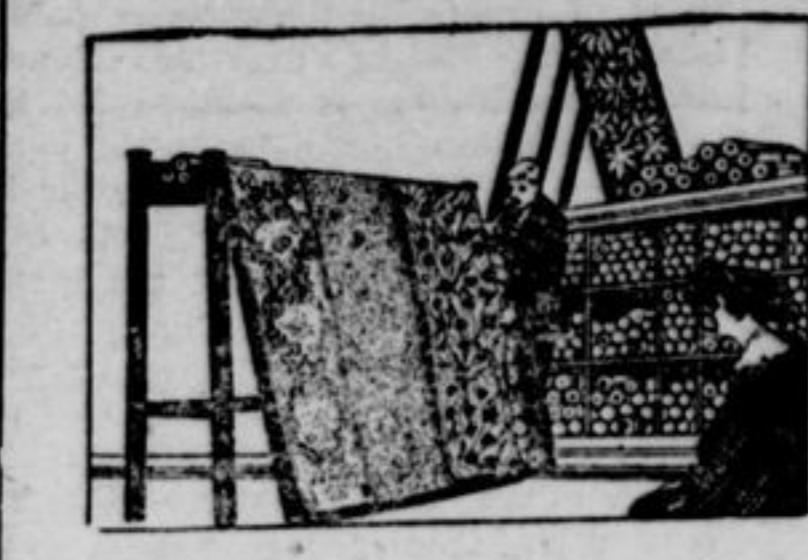
