### Obituary

MRS JOHN MCGILLIVRAY On Saturday Feb 11th, Mrs John McGillivray at the advanced age of 86 years, 10 months passed away to her Eternal home and reward.

She was born in Ross Mull, Argylshire, Scotland, and at the age of ten years came to this country with her parents and settled near Durham.

Her maiden name was Flora Beaton. She was married in 1858 by the late Rev. Alex Stewart and the young couple made their home at Mulock, where she has lived for over 63 years.

Her husband passed away to be with his Lord 5th Dec. 1915.

There were nine children 3 sons, 6 daughters Angus, Mary in infancy and Mrs Clair pre-deceased their mother, leaving Alexander post master Chatsworth, Donald at home, Janet (Mrs Patterson), Pricieville, Flora, (Mrs Long), Walkerton, Elizabeth (Mrs Fulton) Mulock; Margaret (Mrs McGappen, Sask., to mourn the loss of a kind and faithful mother.

One brother, John Beaton, Durham and a sister Janet, Mrs Cameron Kramer, North Dakota and a brother in-law, Donald McGillivray, Elmwood also mourn the departure of a beloved sister.

Another of the old pioneers has passed away now only remembered by what she has been and done. She was able to attend to her household duties until stricken by her last sickness which lasted only a week.

She was afraid to die, but was anxious to depart to be with Christ which is far better. She often prayed during her sickness, "Lord Jesus receive my spirit."

She and her late husband were baptized by the late Rev. Robt. McIntyre in the year 1875 and became members of the Bentinck Baptist Church. Her home was always open to the preachers and she proved a great support to the early Christian work in her district.

The present Pastor and others can testify that they have been much stimulated and encouraged in their ministry by her helpfulness. She had a great memory stored with a splendid knowledge of the Scriptures. Her mind was keen and sympathetic always, and visitors found it an inspiration and a delight to be in her company.

She was a kind hearted and genial neighbour and will be much missed in the community.

Her pastor Rev. Wm. Aird, conducted the funeral service at her late home on Monday Feb 13th speaking from John 14: 2. A large crowd of mourners was present. The remains were taken to the Rocky Saugeen cemetery and laid to rest, to await the call of the Resurrection Morn. - Com.
