#### Training of a Modern Nurse

A clipping from an American paper has reached us, giving us a synopsis of the training of a modern nurse by a former Durham girl, Miss Edith Tunstead, whose mother, Mrs. Blackburn is still a resident of Durham. Edith is practical instructor of Miami Valley Hospital, Ohio, and is now an expert in all that pertains to the nurse's life as the following extracts from a speech at the Westminster Club show:

"Young women undertake various training very frequently against the wishes of their parents, because the parents do not have correct impressions of the work which their daughters desire. Many people believe that the nurse spend practically the first year of their training in scrubbing and other hard labor which has no direct bearing on the profession."

Miss Tunstead gave in detail her own work: "Instruction in personal hygiene is the first course. The early practical work centres around 'Mrs. Chase' a paste doll who receives much care and attention. Bed-making is taught by steps, advancing from the simple process to the making of a bed in which the patient cannot even help himself to turn.

#### Farmers Selling Seed

A letter has been received from Mr. C. Sweet, Chief Seed Division, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, re interpretation of Seed Control Act. He writes in part as follows: "Section 5 mentions that any seed is grown and delivered on the premises of the grower. If however the grower represents his seed to be sold subject to the provisions of this Act then it should have certificates from this Branch representing control sample submitted for analysis and grade. There is one further exception, Section 9, page 3 of the Act. In this section no person, which includes growers, shall sell any seeds of Timothy, Red Clover, Alsike or Alfalfa or any mixture of these seeds if they grade lower than No. 3 or rejected. When farmers are selling any of these latter named seeds on their own premises it is important for them to know that they are liable to prosecution under the Act if the seeds grade ejected, unless sold to Seed Merchant to be re-cleaned. Farmers would realize more from their seed crops if they were to install either individually or preferably a central cleaning machine to clean their seed to standard grade and sell on Government Grade Certificates.

This information is passed along at this time in the hope that it may prove of benefit to the farmers. If any farmer desires to send a sample of seed to be tested they can send it to the Seed Division, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, postage free. Send about 2 or 3 ounces. If more is sent it will only be thrown out at Ottawa or if the farmers prefer, the Department of Agriculture, Markdale will willing forward for them. Each test and grading costs 50c.
