Obituary

MALCOLM McCANNEL

Another of the pioneers of Proton passed away on Feb. 21st at his home in the person of Malcolm McCannel at the age of 66 yrs. He was a son of Alex McCannel, an old time pioneer of Glenelg and was born in Glenelg on June 10th 1856 on the Durham Road near the Egremont and settled on a bush farm in Boothville (now owned by a nephew, Dougal McCannel) here Malcolm spent his boyhood days helping his father head a home out of the dense forest, the house is still to be seen as his work.

In 1874 his father sold his farm and moved into Proton township where he lived until he died, taking with him his three sons, Malcolm, Gilbert and Neil. All worked together harmoniously and cleared those bush farms on which they now live. Malcolm remained on the homestead and in Jan. 18th, 1899 he married Margaret McDoogal of Art. mesia and they were blessed with four sons and three daughters, all of whom are still living with the exception of one son dying in infancy.

Malcolm was a man of genial disposition ever ready to help when called upon and well might say "I have lived a good life, I have kept the faith hence forth there is laid up for me a crown."

He went to bed one week before he died. His pastor, Mr Fowler of Flesherton called to see him on his dying bed and when he was parting with him, he told his pastor he was not afraid to die, so with his wife and family all around he passed into eternity.

He leaves to mourn his departure his life long partner, three sons, James, Sandy, and Neil also three daughters, Katie, Florence and Bella; two sisters, (Annie) Mrs Lauchie McDoogal and (Flora) Mrs Allan Orr, both on the Manitoulin Island, and one brother Neil, who lives across the road from where he died.

The brother and sisters were called upon to suffer a double loss as on January, death claimed another sister (Mary) Mrs Tom McCauley, who died at her home in Walpole, Sask. Another brother, Gilbert dying some years ago. Thus brother and sister have crossed the divide shortly after each other.

The funeral was largely attended, showing the respect in which deceased was held. His pastor Mr Fowler, took for his text, St. John 14: 6. The cortege was conducted by Undertaker Watson from Priceville.

The pall bearers were his four cousins Dougal, Angus, Neil and Donald, also a brother-in-law, Donald McDoogal and a neighbor, Wm. McNalty.

The remains were interred in Evergreen Cemetery in Artemesia near where his life partner lived previous to their marriage.
