**South Grey's M. P. in Parliament**

**Miss Agnes MacPhail gives her Impressions to Review Readers**

Ottawa, March 13, 1922

The Editor, "Durham Review" Durham, Ontario

Dear Sir and South East Grey Friends:

Now that the first days of opening are over, my thoughts turn back to the home constituency of South East Grey, and although I know that the papers would contain a very full account of the Opening, still possibly I can give some little side lights on it that have been missed by more formal writers.

On Wednesday, March 8th, we took our seats and, as was unavoidable with so many new members, we were an uncertain looking crowd, lacking the ease of manner shown by experienced parliamentarians. The name of each member is on a card attached to the side of his desk and so we had no difficulty in finding where we belonged. My seat is in the front row and my seat-mate, our good friend from Dufferin, Mr R. J. Woods.

Mr King was given a good reception when he took his place the first time as Canada's Premier. Soon three great knock-outs came to the door of the Commons and after some parley at the door, the Usher of the Black Rod was admitted. He came in walking most airily and gave three profound bows and informed us that our presence was desired immediately at the Bar of the Senate Chamber.

The Commons then filed out, with the Government leading and came to the Bar. Of course, only a very few of the 235 members could get to the Bar and because there was just one woman, I was given a position in the front between two Cabinet Ministers. While we were standing there, being informed by a deputy of the Governor General that we were to go back to the Commons and elect a Speaker—all of which we knew before we came and which we at once proceeded to do—I heard a good joke. Two men, Liberals, were immediately behind me and in looking over the Senators as they sat in their Chamber, one said to the other, "There's Archie McCoig." His companion could not find him for a few minutes and then suddenly he saw him and said, "That's Archie, and looking as natural as if he were alive." (He had the popular idea of the Senate as a place for the dead!)

After we were once more seated in the Commons, Mr King in an complimentary speech nominated Mr Lemieux, of Gaspé, Quebec, as Speaker. Mr Fielding was the seconder of this Motion. Mr Meighen arose to criticize Mr King because he had intimated, indeed announced some weeks ago that Mr Lemieux would be the Speaker, although in theory we were supposed to be electing him that day. Mr Meighen referred to the fact that the British House of Commons most jealously guarded their rights to really elect a Speaker and he thought the same deference should be shown by the Prime Minister to the Commons here. He then took a little slap at Mr Lemieux regarding some utterances of his during the campaign. He did not, however, back up his criticism by nominating anyone else as Speaker. He did say that he thought it would have been fitting if Mr Boivin, who had

**Good Bye Mr and Mrs D. Gilmour**

A number of appreciative addresses were made and games and reminiscences that made a pleasant evening. Best of good wishes go with them. To Mr David Gilmour and family: Dear Friends:—

Having learned that you purpose leaving this community in the very near future, we, your neighbors and fellow church members have assembled here this evening not only to express our regret at your going and to mourn our loss, as that seems to be only natural and human; but we also wish to sympathize with you in your recent bereavement and to commend you to him who is the source of all comfort. Also to show our appreciation of the high moral principles which always governed your family as far back as we can remember, or says taking your stand for what was pure and noble and elevating, taking an active part in whatever you considered was for the glory of God or the good of your fellow men.

And as we have all had more or less dealing with you as a neighbor, we have found you just and honorable in your dealings, often inclined to be more yielding than aggressive, trying to live up to the Golden Rule. We believe your religion meant more to you than merely a cloak to be worn on Sunday.

But it is especially in connection with our church work that the Hampden people wish to show their appreciation of your services as we fear that your place will be hard to fill.

Having in the year 1896 united with Hampden church of which the older members of your family were, always staunch and loyal supporters, we find in looking up the records, that you have been engaged in active church service almost ever since. Having taught a class in the S. S. for some time before, being appointed as Superintendent of the S. S. in the year 1902, which office you have held continuously ever since and being elected as an elder of the church in 1915, you have honorably acted in the triple capacity of Member of Session, Supt. and teacher, often taking the Senior class of boys and trying faithfully and patiently to instill into their minds the truths of the gospel.

And we believe you have had the joy of seeing many of your scholars take their stand on the side of Christ. Being naturally of a retiring disposition, you were sometimes slow in speaking, but when you did your words were always with wisdom and carried conviction with them. But friends we are assured of this, that though your leaving Hampden will be a loss to us, it will be a gain in some other corner of our Master's vineyard, for we feel sure you will continue to work under the same banner as you have here.

And now our friends we hope you will accept these small gifts from the Hampden congregation in the same spirit in which they are given, not as being in anyway a remuneration for your services in the past but there are some accounts which can never be settled here, but rather as a token of the high esteem in which you are held by your neighbors and fellow church members of Hampden. And we also as a congregation and a community, extend to you our very best wishes for your future happiness and success. And should you at any time in the future feel inclined to come back, which would be quite natural, as we think there is no place like Hampden, you may feel sure of receiving a hearty welcome by the congregation.
