**Re Advertising**  
A Modern Romance

Newspaper advertising as we know it is largely a product of the twentieth century, although I think the first announcement in a newspaper that could rightly be called an advertisement appeared in May, 1622—it advertised a book called "The Divine Right of Church Government," written by sundry eminent ministers in the city of London. But the first paid announcement, I believe, appeared in September 1658, and was for the then new product, tea. It read:

"That excellent and by all physicians approved China drink, called by the Chinese Toha by other nations Tay, alias Tee, is sold at the Sultaness Head a cophee house in Sweetings Rents, by the Royal Exchange, London."

Advertising has done some traveling since that far-off day. It has passed through many phases. Mr Frank Presbrey says: "Coming up from the circus lots and patent medicine fields, a rather awkward, unethical, loud talking youth, in ill-fitting clothes, it had little enough, at first beyond endless energy to recommend it, and its reception among business men was a cool one. Gradually it got down to work and began to study."

Now we have the beautifully illustrated advertisement representing a small fortune in drawings, engravings, etc., before it reaches the composing room of the paper. How long do you think the public would remember to ask for certain famous products if their makers ceased advertising? A full year without newspaper advertising would result in such a set-back that it would take years to catch up with their former popularity with the public again.

**They Shut Durham Out**

Durham's second team in the Int. O. A. L. A. had the door shut in their face at the schedule meeting in Mt Forest last Thursday night. The other three teams—Arthur, Mt Forest and Harrison were almost a unit in refusing to play with Durham in the district, as with Durham's lacrosse reputation, they feared they wouldn't have much of a show. J. H. Harding, R. L. Saunders and C. S. Burnett were Durham delegates, and even after explaining that Durham's second team, the "Bluebirds" was nearly all Juniors and Juveniles, with no outside boys, they would not admit Durham. Lorne Smith of Mt. Forest, the convener, was agreeable as was also a Harrison man. There were three delegates from each town, and on a vote being taken to accept Durham's entry, these two and the three Durham delegates voted in favor, while the three Arthur and two each from Harrison and Mt Forest, voted against. Thus it was a 7-5 turnout, and Durham Bluebirds must seek a grouping elsewhere.

They now desire grouping with Wingham, Kincardine and Southampton, and this may be arranged, though Southampton wants a double schedule with Kincardine only.

Durham's No 1 Int. team which was grouped with Wingham, found that team hostile also to Durham company. The Durhams themselves didn't fancy a double schedule with Wingham, as the games would be rather one-sided, so they are now better pleased with their new grouping with Fergus, Shelburne and Orangeville, which will give them speedy company and better games and gates. All are good lacrosse towns, and the district winner should go a long way in the semi-finals.

**Business Reviving**

A monthly commercial letter issued by the Canadian Bank of Commerce has a hopeful ring about it that gives rise to optimism. The offerings of cattle for January, February and March however are considerable below the same months of 1921, but hogs have jumped up over 60000 over 1921. Sheep and calves except at Toronto have held their own and a little more. The number of business failures have been decreasing week by week, though they are still above 1921. We quote a few paragraphs:

Although commercial payments throughout Canada, and particularly in the prairie provinces, are still far from being satisfactory, the demand on the part of farmers for short-term credit and mortgage loans is not as insistent as at the close of last year and the requests for seed grain loans from the government or the municipalities are much less numerous than anticipated. The improvement is due to the rise in prices of farm products; for instance, No. 1 Northern Wheat (Fort William basis) sold on April 15 at \$1.45 1/2 per bushel as compared with \$1.07 1/2 in January last. The advance is substantial, and the expectation of lower freight rates, lower prices for the articles the farmer must buy in order to carry on his operations and lower farm wages forms the basis of the new optimism in the west.

Since January there has been an advance of approximately 12 1/2 per cent in the price of domestic raw wool. Meanwhile consumption is keeping fully abreast of production, and for some grades the demand is becoming firm. There appears to be justification for the hope that the price of wool is becoming more stable. Canada's foreign trade in March amounted to \$140,000,000, an increase of \$38,886,144 over February and \$11,610,939 over January of this year.

In spite of occasional lapses, Canada appears to have recovered from the depression of the early winter and to be in a better position as far as her purchasing power is concerned. There is no reason, however, why she should relax her vigilance over her resources or her expenditures extravagant purchases abroad.
