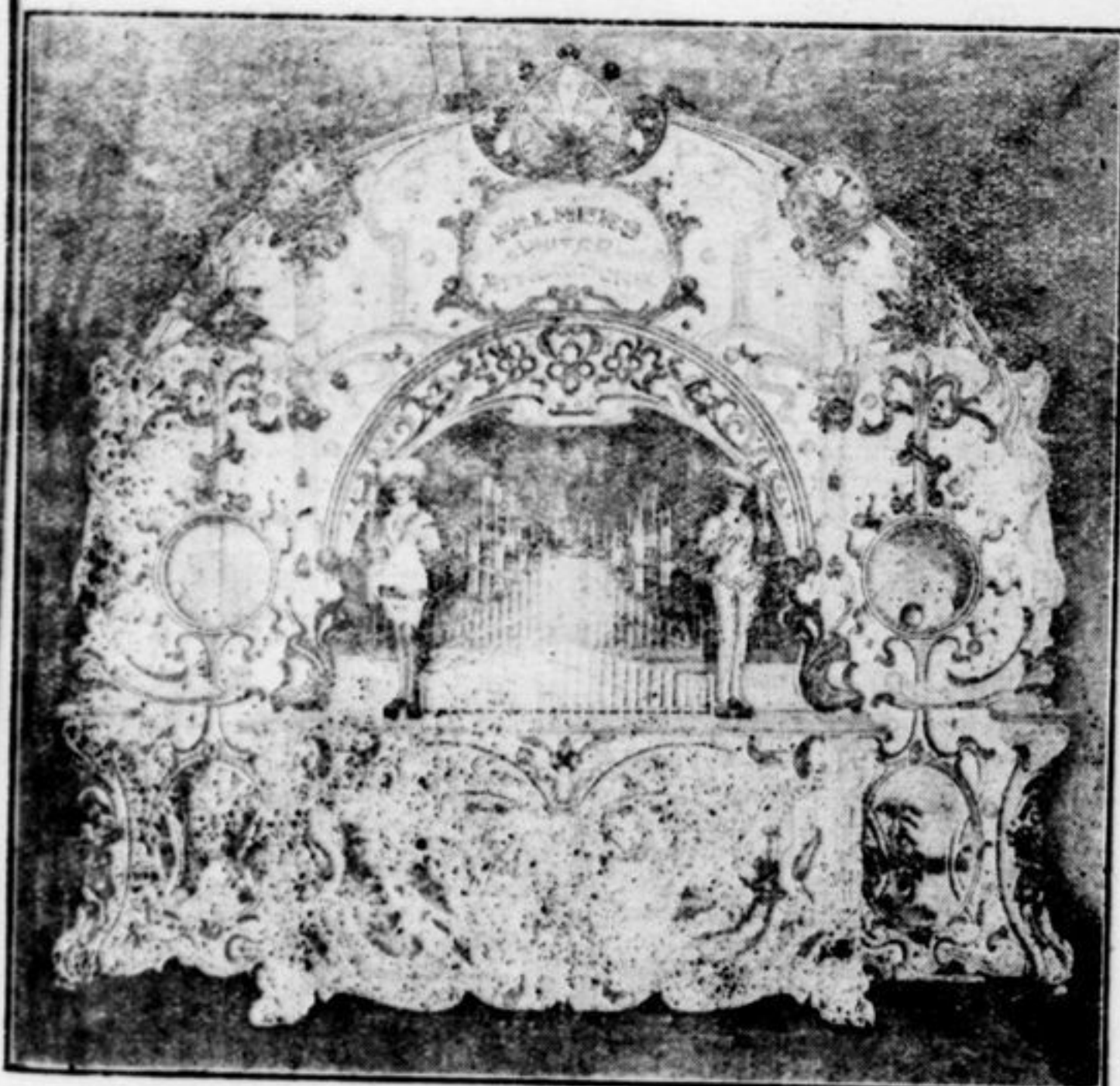

A splendid address was given by Mrs Boyes of Lefroy on "Open Secrets" and "Methods of making work effective in the Institutes." Misses Kerr, Snyder and Davidson assisted with the program, also Miss Bertha Bilton and Mr B. Eccles. G. P. Bate-man of Mt. Forest was present and spoke in the interest of Strathcona hospital. The ladies decided to help furnish a room in the hospital and also voted to assist the township school fair which is held here this year.

A pleasant feature of the meeting was the presentation of a beautiful bouquet of flowers to the retiring resident, Mrs Rife, who has been a very efficient officer for the past two years. A dainty lunch was served at the close of the meeting. The Sec'y's report was as follows:
