To Promote Sheep Industry

The sheep breeders of the Tp. of Egremont recently received some encouragement from the Dept of Agriculture of the Prov. of Ont. and also from the same Dept. at Ottawa.

T. S. Cooper, Agricultural Representative at Markdale, and his assistants, spent several days docking and castrating lambs. The principal object in view was to give instruction in the arts of docking and castration in more attention to this work in future and thereby be able to put on the market a better class of lambs.

This work has been much neglected in past years resulting in a decreased price to the producer and a less palatable article to the consumer.

The work was neatly performed and without any less so far as the writer knows. Last week Mr Cooper came again to this locality and built a concrete dipping tank on Lot 12 con 13, where all sheep breeders can have their sheep dipped, thereby promoting the health of their flock and again adding to their wealth.

For the past two years sheep dipping has been practised here and all who dipped their flocks were benefited. The concrete tank was built on the 24th May.

Next day the Dept. at Ottawa sent their representative, J. A. Talbot of Paris, Ont. who with his able assistants, held a sheep shearing exhibition on Mr Neil Calder's farm. There were four power clipping machines and three hand power shears. Mr Howard gave a practical illustration in sheep shearing and in folding the fleece for market.

Following this exhibition J. A. Talbot invited the young men present to a contest in sheep shearing. This put life and earnestness into the old and young who were present.

Mr Alex Calder was the first to finish and was awarded second place. First place and prize money was secured by Chas. M. McGillivray who made an excellent finish leaving very little outside of the pelt.

Mr Telfer then gave an interesting address to the farmers, urging all to do the best possible for the care of their flocks so that the top market price would be secured. All present clipping and folding and in the very instructive address delivered.

In addition to the foregoing the U. F. O. Club of Yeovil expect a Mr Telfer, owner of the Canadian Co operative Wool Growers' Association to deliver an address in their club room next Monday evening on "Best Method of marketing wool." The Club expects to ship a carload of wool from Holstein on June 17th.
