Fielding Budget has 18 Majority Ottawa was de ply stirred up Tues-day night over the conclusion of the budget debate. The Drayton amend-ment, really a vote of want of confidence ment, Maud Kelsey, Helen McAuliffe, was snowed under 49 to 169. On the Raymond McGirr. budget itself the vote was 101 to 119, a majority of 18, larger than had been expected. Liberals voted solid for the budget and nine Progressives and one independent voted with them. Miss Mc-Phail's vote will surprise and disappoint many of her friends. 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
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
