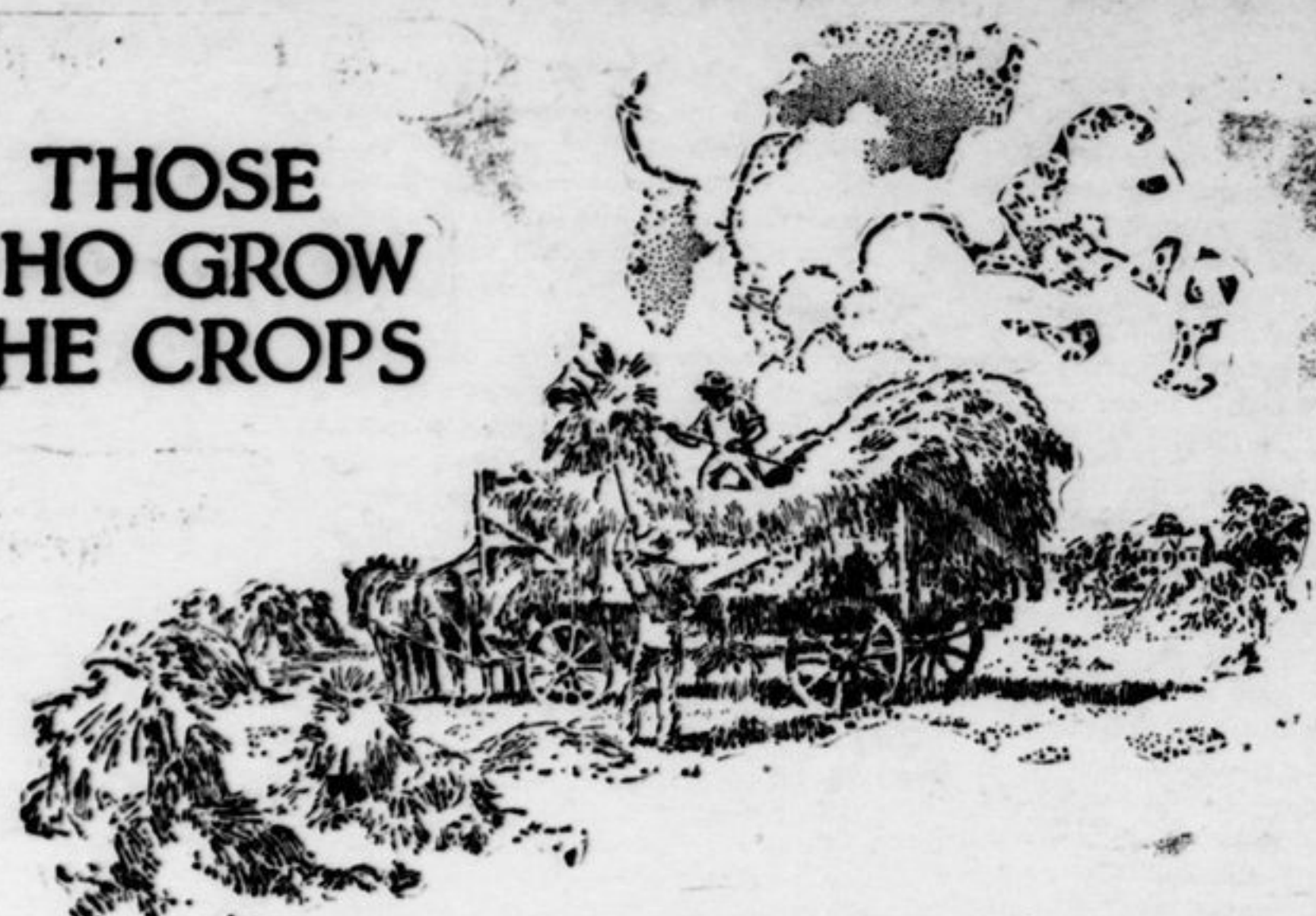

They said little or nothing at the time, but after the game was lost to them, they looked about for excuses to protest and forgot their promise before the contest. The W. F. A. have evidently considered a penalty at its face value, even if the agreement was satisfactory to both teams at first, and have thrown the game out.
