**Manitoba in the Limelight**

Seldom has a provincial election excited such interest over all the Dominion as has that of Manitoba which is taking place to-day, Tuesday. The result will not be known in Winnipeg for a day or two as the system of proportional representation in vogue there, makes counting slow work. No fewer than 43 candidates are running for the 10 positions. The ballot is a formidable affair, 22 inches long and 9 wide, with the 43 names in alphabetical order. Among the 43 candidates are 8 Progressives. Throughout the Province both Liberals and Progressives are claiming victory, but it is doubtful if any one group will have a majority. If not, then a group government is to have another trial.

Later—the elections have given the Farmer and Progressive parties 25 members, Liberals 8, Independent 8, Conservative 6, Labor 5 with three ridings still to hear from.

**The Russian Problem**

The Hague Conference seems about to adjourn and little or nothing accomplished. The great trouble in Russia: she wants a big loan from the other nations and they are firm in their demand that no loan will be given until she restores or agrees to restore private property she has confiscated. This she refuses to do. Russia under Bolshevik or Soviet rule has made a demerit to the world how a nation should not be governed. She has degraded social life, has so harassed agriculture that the once great exporting nation can not feed herself. They killed off the intellectuals and industries are suffering and reports say they are laying hands on the wealth of the church. No wonder the nations refuse loans to a country whose rulers seem possessed of a kind

of madness. The Hague conference has done one thing, it has exposed the Soviet government to the world as a body seemingly intent on pulling down civilization.

**Bentnick Council**

Bentnick, July 10, 1922

Special meeting called to discuss advisability of building bridges. Reports were read from County and Provincial Engineers stating that our bridges were, no doubt, if kept in good repair, suitable for the traffic at the time they were built, but no part of these bridges was designed for the heavy traffic over our highways at the present time. The timbers in the bridges in some cases are giving way and could not be rebuilt unless a complete reconstruction was made.

Prov. Engineer Lumsden states that bridges of that design throughout the province have not proved to be satisfactory for heavy traffic and are being replaced by permanent structures.

The Council decided to rebuild Kennedy's, Clark Torry's and Aberdeen (north) bridges this year, thereby having certain roads over which heavy traffic could be diverted in order to give the Municipality time to rebuild the balance. The building of the other bridges and issuing of debentures will be decided later and only a part of the cost of construction will be levied this year.
