**The Bank of Montreal's Crop report is always interesting. Extraordinarily heavy crops are reported in Ontario, Quebec and Maritime provinces. The prairie provinces show fairly well but rain badly needed in a number of places.**

**Following is the summary for Ontario:**

**Weather conditions are conducive to good growth although rain is a little too frequent. Fall wheat, cutting general, crop above average. Spring wheat, barley and rye in good condition with promise of heavy yield. Oats heading out well; maximum crop expected. Peas good crop. Corn picking up well; expect average crop. Hay all harvested; bumper crop. Small fruits a heavy crop. Peaches, plums, pears and grapes, prospects excellent. Root crops first-class condition. Pastures very good.**

**The Warning From Illinois**  
(Minneapolis Journal)  
America's immigration policy has already begun to bite the hand that established it. From all outward evidences Herrin, Ill., the scene of one of the most dastardly strikes was the county has ever known, is not a community in America but a cross section of the Old World.

**Since when have Americans been known to tie men together in groups and then order them to run, while a mob howled with delight as it pumped lead into them?**

**When, if ever, has American womanhood been represented as denying the plea of water from a bullet-ridden victim with the remark, "I'll see you in hell before you get any water?"**

**Where before has America deserved the reputation for the low brutality and barbarism that characterized the action of striking miners at Herrin?**

**Does anyone believe real America did these things? God knows the untruth of such a charge. America and Americans value so much a land of fair play that they have invited the oppressed everywhere to become a part of us. Freedom and liberty are such a common thing to America that we have opened our doors wide and flooded our land with a host of foreigners, who have neither the training nor the mind to know the difference between liberty and license. America and Americans have been so indifferent to the pollution of their citizenship, they have blinded themselves with a fable about a melting pot and have hitherto held that contact with such magic could change barbarism to civilization over night.**

**Herrin, Ill, disputes such logic. It seeks to warn America of evils in its immigration policy. It raises the cry, "Shut the gates! Shut the gates!"**

**For the facts of Herrin, Ill., are these: The men who tied their fellows in groups for purposes of slaughter; the women who shouted "let's make soap" of the mangled and still breathing bodies were not Americans, but prospective citizens.**

**The terrible tragedy at Herrin serves a useful lesson to Americans by revealing horrors that can expect in greater number in the future if America does not completely shut its gates to the immigrant.**
