Middle School and Matriculation Results.

Below are the Middle School and Matriculation Results. The number of students is indicated by the number of the subject. "C" stands for credit, "X" stands for pass standing. Any subject having "1, 2, 3, C" opposite it indicates the student has passed in that subject. An "X" indicates a subject has been tried on and the student failed in the subject. A student's success or failure is measured by the number of subjects he has obtained out of the total number tried. It is also shown by the honors: 1st class honors, 75-100 per cent; 2nd class honors, 60-74 per cent; 3rd class honors, 50-65 per cent and credit, ("C") 50-59 per cent.

Table with columns for subjects like Eng. Comp., Eng. Literature, Br. History, Ancient History, Algebra, Geometry, Physics, Chemistry, Latin Authors, Latin Comp., French Authors, French Comp. and rows of student names and their results.
